

#### What has your journey been like when you started as a lawyer in Reunion?

My journey from childhood to becoming a lawyer began in Majunga, Madagascar where I was born and completed my primary and secondary education there. At the age of 15, I moved to Reunion. Thereafter, I moved to Lyon, France where I undertook my Bachelor of Law. I then pursued my Masters of Law in Reunion for two years and moved on to spend a year in Paris where I embarked on the challenging journey to becoming a barrister at the French Bar School of Paris. Upon returning to Reunion, I was a Professor and Lecturer of law. In 2009, I was admitted to the Bar and have been practicing as a Barrister since, specializing in Civil Law, Commercial Law, and in certain cases, Criminal Law. I currently run a successful legal practice of my own in Reunion and have the privilege of practicing law in both Reunion and France.

#### When did you first start serving the community and who inspired you to do so?

From a young age, I had a dream of serving the community but the focus was always to prioritize education. However, the passion to serve reignited when I moved to Reunion for my legal studies. I started by joining the local Madrasah as a Gujarati teacher as I hold the language very dear to me and advocate for its importance. In 1992, I became the Honorary Joint Secretary of the Jamaat and in the year 2000, a board was established to manage the Madrasah which I then joined as a member. However, I used to always extend my professional services and share my expertise with all Jamaat Presidents in Reunion on legal and constitutional matters. Various community elders and Jamaat Presidents including my late father have inspired me to serve the community. However, Marhum Mulla Asgarali M Jaffer has been a significant inspiration. Marhum Mulla Asgarali was a great orator and leader who had a vision of uniting and structuring the community. His speeches and leadership left a lasting impact on the community, even years after his passing.

#### How did you first assume leadership authority?

In 2005, it was suggested that an association to unite all four Jamaats in Reunion under one should be formed to create a more effective and coordinated structure between the Jamaats. Having actively participated in CROI Assembly sessions and showing a keen interest in community affairs, I believed this to be the best way forward for the community in Reunion. Thus, on 31st July 2005, an assembly of all Reunion Jamaats was held and a federation was formed which was named Union des Associations Khojas Shia Isnashri de la Réunion (UAKSIR) of which I had the honor and privilege of drafting the constitution of the newly formed Federation and have been instrumental in initiating and proposing subsequent amendments.

Then in 2009, my father, Marhum Alihoussen Goulamaly Nassor, served as the President of the Saint-Denis Jamaat for a term of two years, and in 2011, I was elected as the President of UAKSIR and in 2013, under my leadership, UAKSIR joined the Africa Federation and by virtue of my position, I assumed the role of the Vice Chairman of Africa Federation and thereafter I was elected as the Chairman of Africa Federation in 2022.



What have you done as the Africa Federation Chairman in your first year?

As the Chairman of the Africa Federation, my focus in the past year has been to spearhead the organization to a higher level. I have been actively visiting various Jamaats around Africa, irrespective of their size, to strengthen unity and coordination between the Federation and the Jamaats and also learn of the diverse challenges as each Jamaat has its own challenges.

Apart from improving our coordination with the Jamaats, I have continuously emphasized the importance of upholding Marja'eeyat (religious leadership) and Aqidah (belief) as the foundation of the Africa Federation. I believe that strong spiritual and religious principles are essential for the community's educational, social, and economic upliftment. I had the honor of visiting our grand Marja, Ayatollah al Udhma Sayyid Ali Al Husseini al-Sistani (May Almighty grant him a long and healthy life) whose wisdom, guidance, and blessings are key to our institution's success and regards our institution very highly for being very well structured and organized.

Apart from the spiritual sphere, education has been a key area of focus, with increased loan amounts from USD 8000 to USD 10000 a year and we have worked hard to procure more funding and have significant pledges received from donors and philanthropists like the Jaffer Family Foundation and Razaaly bhai Hirdjee.

We also conducted a successful housing survey and are now actively working towards the vision of having every community member own a house and are also in the final stages of getting a life insurance plan for our members. We intend to have this as part of our broadened vision of creating a culture of our members having investments as a means of supplementary income.

We are also working closely with all stakeholders and better communication within the institution to enable a more progressive approach.



What are the most important skills for a leader to have?

In terms of leadership skills, a leader needs to be strong both mentally and spiritually. In times of adversity, and living in a world where everyone has diverse opinions and needs, a leader must be able to maintain tolerance, and a calm demeanor to uphold unity. Leaders should be aware of their responsibilities and the high expectations the community has of them and must act in accordance with the community's benefit and not their own.



How do you motivate your team?

My main means of motivation is to focus on the abilities of my team and remind them of our objective and what we are here to do as servants of the Imam of our time. I advise them not to be influenced by rumors on social media and stress the importance of focusing on the community's betterment.

#### How do you handle conflict in a team?

Handling conflicts on a team requires fairness and patience. Leaders should avoid favoritism and consider the constitution and the weight of their statements when addressing conflicts. Words matter most when resolving a conflict and once said cannot be retracted. A just and thoughtful approach is essential.

#### How do you delegate tasks?

Delegating tasks involves placing trust in various boards and individuals within the organization. While tasks are delegated, as Office Bearers we must maintain an oversight to ensure efficiency. Personal communication and support are also important to keep board chairs motivated.



#### How do you respond to feedback?

Our community members have different opinions. Leaders should listen to feedback and make necessary changes when needed to meet the community's needs. Sometimes, the work done is not realized and appreciated at that point in time, but in the future, this may be beneficial to the community.

#### Tell us about a time you had a significant impact on a team or project.

A significant impact I had on a project was the establishment of a community school in Reunion. Despite the challenge of competing with high-standard public schools in a place like Reunion, we successfully founded the school, which provides education while allowing girls to maintain their hijab. Over the years, the school has grown, and it currently serves both primary and secondary education with 120 students. Furthermore, as a Barrister, I helped our members of Madagascar "Association les Oubliés de la décolonisation" on a pro bono basis to obtain French citizenship through the appropriate legal channels in Paris, France.

#### How do you set priorities as a leader?

Setting priorities as a leader involves considering the community's evolving needs in all aspects and maintaining a balance between professional, personal, and community time.

I truly acknowledge and appreciate the strong support and encouragement I have received from

my family, especially my parents, my brother and my wife, Nazia in pursuing my leadership roles. My family's blessing and encouragement have played a crucial role in my decision to run for the position of Africa Federation Chairman.



#### **Concluding remarks**

In the year 2013, my team and I met with the then Africa Federation Office Bearers under the Chairmanship of Alhaj Anwarali Dharamsi, Alhaj Shabir Najafi as the Vice Chairman, Alhaj Aunali Khalfan as the Hon. Secretary and Alhaj Kumail Manji as the Asst. Hon Secretary as well as Alhaj Asghar Moledina the then President of the World Federation and a natural bond was created between us and this was further manifested when we, UAKSIR joined the Africa Federation and not forgetting Alhaj Mojiz Bhai Khamis who was the Vice President of CROI.

A sincere appreciation to Alhajj Shabir Najafi and Alhajj Aunali Khalfan who have always had confidence in me and I must thank my entire team of Office Bearers, boards, and staff without whom I am incomplete.

## THE AFRICA FEDERATION 28TH ORDINARY CONFERENCE & 84TH SUPREME COUNCIL SESSION AWARDS AND AFED TEAM 2022 - 2025

The 28th Triennial Conference and the 84th Supreme Council Session of the Federation of KSI Jamaats of Africa was successfully hosted by KSI Jamaat Dar es Salaam from 14th to 17th July 2022.

The Ceremonial Opening Ceremony of the Conference was held on Thursday 14th July 2022 night and commenced with the recitation and reflection of verses from the Holy Qur'an by Br. Abbasaley Abbas.

The President of Dar-es-Salaam Jamaat Alhaj Mohamedraza Dewji addressed the gathering followed by addresses by the Chairman of Conseil Regional, Alhaj Haniphe Akbarally, Secretary General of the Council of European Jamaats (COEJ), Sister Sabira Lakha and the World Federation President Alhaj Safdar Jaffer

At the World Federation you were a Nominated Councillor from 2007 – 2009 and were then elected as an Executive Councillor of the World Federation in 2009.

Your support and encouragement played a vital role in his life following the Uganda Exodus in 1972 which led to migration and settling in a new domicile. He was known to attribute his success in various major projects during his tenure as Dar-es-Salaam Jamaat President to you for your moral and spiritual support. You have been a dedicated Community worker and have served in various capacities in the Ladies Managing Community of the Jamaat and remain a member of the KSIJ Welfare Committee to-date.

You have contributed what was most precious; your time and your talent, in your dedication and services to the Community for over half a century

Born in Zanzibar on 26th April 1950, Alhaj Aunali Kassamali Khalfan, your passion and zeal in serving the Community goes down as a legacy in the family. As one example, when your grandfather, Alhaj Abdulrasul Ali Mohamed Khalfan died while in the position of the President of Hujjatul Islam Jamaat in Zanzibar at the age of 58 in 1944 both the Jamaats announced closure of business of the community on the day of his funeral. Such a veneration remains unprecedented in the history of the community in Zanzibar.

In Africa Federation, you were the Chairman of Central Health Board (CHB) for 15 years and played a pivotal role in introducing the India route for medical treatment abroad for our Community members and arranged several medical camps, consultations visits by medical specialists to the Jamaats in mainland and Madagascar. Then in 2010, you were appointed Honorary Secretary of Africa Federation under the Chairmanship of Alhaj Anwarali Dharamsi for two terms till 2016. You were then elected during my tenure as Vice Chairman of Africa Federation from mainland Africa from 2016 – 2022. You played an important role in the leadership of Africa Federation in its objectives to become self-sufficient for posterity, the exercise which still continues. You were also nominated as an Executive Councillor of the World Federation from 2010 to-date.

In 2021, the family of Alhaj Murtaza Somji donated a building in Tanga to Africa Federation, the income from this property shall be used for various humanitarian and social activities by Africa Federation.

Both the families have served this community in several spheres for the past many decades, be it in East Africa or beyond the borders of Africa.



Out of the students that have benefitted from this scheme, 6 students have successfully completed

their degrees and have commenced repayment of the loans. The repayments from these students is then used for other new applicants.

Organizations such as Khaki Foundation is of good support in supplementing AFED's Higher Education Loan Scheme Program. The Vice Chairman of the Africa Federation, Alhaj Aunali Khalfan expressed appreciation to the Khaki Foundation for the support, also in taking keen interest in the development and taking time out to meet with AFED Officials. Aunali Bhai Khalfan explained that the needs for education funding, including the Tabligh & Economic Upliftment is huge and therefore the East African diaspora like Mohamed Jawad and others can make a big difference. He requested Mohamed Jawad bhai to assist further, especially in Higher Education funding and scholarships.



He mentioned that the Youth Board was also working at bringing more youth related content for the benefit of the community youth fraternity. Also, Sports Council is working on having a grand sports festival before end of 2023.

Alhaj Amine bhai pointed out that housing is still an issue in many Jamaats. The Housing Development Board has shared a survey and requested all the community members to complete the survey. The data gathered from the survey will form basis of a structured plan for future planning of projects in out constituent Jamaats.

Alhaj Amine bhai stressed regarding Mosques being place of worship and our heritage and therefore we should always aim to maintain them. Many mosques in small towns like Lindi, Mwanza, Lamu etc. need renovations and the AFED Housing Board has taken the responsibility to do the needful.

He further mentioned that our forefathers worked hard to build mosques and acquire properties, and now we should take care of these properties. Lamu is one such property that has depilated and in need of restoration. AFED has appointed Alhaj Amir bhai Merali to head this restoration project. Alhaj Amine bhai appealed to every community member to contribute any amount for the Lamu project and earn sawaab-e-jaariyah.

He urged all the community members to join the AFED mailing list to keep abreast with the activities of the Africa Federation. He also requested the Jamaats to circulate electronically the AFED News Bulletins, Circulars, etc. Amine bhai emphasized the importance of unity among ourselves and building bridges of cooperation with other faiths and communities in towns and cities we live.

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## AFRICA FEDERATION DELEGATION VISITS KAMPALA JAMAAT

The Africa Federation Chairman, Alhaj Amine Nassor accompanied by the AFED Vice Chairman, Alhaj Aunali Khalfan, AFED Hon. Secretary Alhaj Zuhair Jaffer and AFED Economic Development Board Chairman, Alhaj Murtaza Somji travelled to Kampala for an official visit to Kampala Jamaat from 6th to 8th March 2023.

This was the first visit to Kampala Jamaat by AFED Chairman following his election and investiture to the office in July 2022.

During the visit the AFED delegation held a consultative meeting with the Kampala Jamaat Managing Committee and Trustees of the Jamaat at which several issues pertaining to the Federation, Jamaat, Properties and Economic Development were discussed. A meeting was also held with Bilal Uganda officials at their head office after a visit to the sites.

Alhamdullilah, the population of our community members in Kampala is about 600 heads presently, this includes women and children. Also, more families and the number of job seekers from India and Pakistan who are keen to develop their future are growing. Prior to 1972, the population of our community in Uganda was about 4000 heads, once a thriving and affluent KSI community in East Africa whose support to Africa Federation was enormous, both in leadership as well as financial contributions. We are pleased to record that a number of families have returned to Uganda starting from 1990, and the Jamaat membership is steadily growing with the arrival of families from Indian Sub-Continent and other countries.

There are good business opportunities in Uganda for our community members who are willing to invest and take part in the economic growth of the country, whilst the population of Uganda is 48.5 million growing at about 3.1% annually. sectors of CROI and Jamaats which was followed by questions from the floor.







# SHERE KUTCH BIDS FAREWELL TO THIS TEMPORARY WORLD ALHAJ AUNALI YUSUFALI SALEHMOHAMED – OBITUARY



The Africa Federation Secretariat is deeply saddened to receive the news of the demise of Alhaj Aunali Yusufali Salehmohamed, which occurred in Ahmedabad on Thursday 20th April 2023 (28th Mahe Ramadhan 1444 A.H.) and he was buried the same night in Bag-e-Sukun Kabrastan.

Born in Zanzibar in 1939, he undertook his primary and secondary education there. He started his social services at a very young age as a volunteer of Hujjatul Islam Jamaat (Nai Misid). He was involved in community sports activities and served as a treasurer of Ithna Asheri Gymkhana and was also a Troop Leader of Ithna Asheri Boy Scouts in Zanzibar.

He was a cricket enthusiast and was an official scorer of the Zanzibar Ithna-Asheri Cricket Team for many years. He was always in the forefront and vocal to protest whenever he realized a player was unjustly victimized on the cricket ground, he was a great supporter of the Community Cricket Team in Zanzibar.

He moved to Dar es Salaam in 1966, same year he joined the Husseini Society (KSI Jamaat Madressah) as a teacher and later as the Secretary and as Chairman of Husseini Society from 1970 to 1974. He was also the Captain of the Husaini Volunteer Corps of Dar es Salaam Jamaat for 6 years; Secretary of Union Nursery School and Liaison Officer of the Ladies Section.

He migrated to Dubai in 1974 and during his short stay there, at the time the Shia Ithna Asheri Jamaat in Deira, Dubai was formed and he was elected as a Committee Member where he also served as volunteer in the Jamaat.

Aunali bhai spent four years in Karachi, Pakistan and served as Captain of the Volunteers of Mehfil-e-Murtaza and was in charge of Hussaini Madressa.

In 1980, he migrated to India and settled in Surat, Gujarat where he was involved in Tabligh work, and served in many community activities, mainly helping the needy and old people.

He was a regular visitor to Kutch where he carried out several projects as well as took part in numerous social and welfare works. He was instrumental along with other members in uniting all Kutch Jamaats to form the Kutch Federation in 1988. His love and affection in extending social services for the poor people in the region earned him the title of Shere Kutch.

Aunali bhai, worked closely with the World Federation Secretariat in many projects throughout Gujarat; in the fields of housing for the needy families and in the education sector. As a liaison officer of the World Federation from 1988 – 2003 and under the leadership of the then World Federation President Late Mulla Asghar Ali M.M. Jaffer as his representative in India, he espoused the cause of Housing, Education, Medical and other welfare activities in many parts of India and by his tireless efforts have brought about much needed results of community advancement and progress.

The works he did for the development of Masjids, Imambarghas and religious activities in different parts of India will always remain in the memory of the community he served.

Among his multi-faceted efforts, notably is the educational field for which he did a commendable work through the Zainabiya Child Sponsorship Scheme (ZCSS) of World Federation whose Liaison Officer he was from 1987 to 2010.

Aunali Bhai was always available to accompany leaders and officials from the World Federation, Africa Federation, other organizations and donors from different parts of the world on the inspection of their projects in India which included visiting to some remote villages in India.

As an Executive Councilor of the World Federation, many organizations sought his guidance. He volunteered to monitor projects in India by the World Federation, NASIMCO, Africa Federation and generous donors, which is not an easy task to carry out in remote parts of India.

Aunali bhai was always at service for the Africa Federation Central Health Board (CHB) during its initial years of establishing contacts in India for patients from Africa. His guidance and services to our patients was invaluable.

He was honored jointly by all the six Jamaats of Kutch in 1986 and again by Kutch Federation in January 2000 in presence of Marhum Mulla Saheb at Kera. He was also honored by the Council of Gujarat in January 2000.

He was honored by the World Federation in 2002 and was awarded The Late Mulla Asghar Ali M.M. Jaffer Memorial Award for the services to Gujarat and Kutch at the time of the earthquake of 2001.

In 2006, the Husseini Madressah of KSI Jamaat of Dar

es Salaam honored him a Memento during their 50 years celebrations. Central Health Board (CHB) of Africa Federation has also given him Certificate in 2010 for his cooperation and services to the patients in Ahmedabad.

In the last few years, due to advance age, Aunali Bhai retired from active engagements, however he kept himself well-informed on the community affairs, especially the Africa Federation and the World Federation developments.

"A loss of a dear friend and a caring social worker" – Alhaj Aunali Salehmohamed – We became close friends since we migrated from Zanzibar to Dar es Salaam in the later part of 1960s. Marhum was a beacon of hope for many, his zeal and drive towards the alleviation of poverty in several parts of Gujarat will be cherished for many years to come.

Sad as it is to lose a friend and a dedicated community worker – Insha'allah his legacy will live on.

Marhum was a dedicated community member and served his home Jamaat Bukoba for many years before moving to Dar-es-Salaam where he served in various sections which include Tabligh and Medical.

Roshan Bhai served as Chairman of the then Setwel Board of Africa Federation and played a major part in resettling the displaced members of our community from Somalia in various parts of the world.

Marhum also served Dar es Salaam Jamaat in Medical Board, he also served in Bilal Muslim Mission of Tanzania in 1985/1986 during the period of the establishment of Bilal Dispensary at Temeke.

Marhum played major role in the establishment of the AFED Archives sub-section which was formed in 2007, he was the head of the sub-section of Archives until his retirement in 2014. He was instrumental in procuring some equipment like scanners and printers to enable the Archives documents in the possession of the AFED Secretariat to be scanned and saved digitally.

His passion in the Community services was immense and he continued to share his collection of documents and photographs with the Archive section for several years after retirement.

### COMMUNITY BIDS FAREWELL TO LEGEND ALHAJ MOHAMED HUSSEIN ALI NATHOO

#### - OBITUARY



It is with immense sorrow and grief that the Africa Federation Secretariat received the sad news of the sudden demise of Murrabi Alhaj Mohamed Hussein Ali Nathoo, who passed away in Dar-es-Salaam on Thursday 17th August 2023 and was buried the same night.

Born in Zanzibar 11th February 1946 he was amongst the nine children blessed to his parents Hussein and Rukiya Nathoo. He obtained his primary and secondary education in Zanzibar.

He was the grandson of Murabbi Hajji Ali Nathoo, a selfless, devoted leader of the community and a philanthropist who played major role in the construction of the Zanzibar Kuwwatul Islam Jamaat Mosque, famously known as Junni Masjid in Kiponda area, the first Mosque of the Khoja Shia Ithna-Asheries in the world built in 1881 in Zanzibar. Hajji Ali Nathoo served as the President of Khoja Shia Ithna-Asheri Kuwwatul Islam Jamaat Zanzibar for 28 years, he passed away in 1957 at the age of 86.

Mohamed Bhai's sporting career started in the narrow streets of Zanzibar with volleyball and cricket as his favorite games, he represented his primary and secondary schools in both these games and played for the Ithna-Asheri Gymkhana 'A' division in cricket and Zanzibar Combine in volleyball at the young age of 16.

On his migration to Dar-es-Salaam in 1967 he joined the Ithna-Asheri Union Sports Club (Union Sports Club) and played for its volleyball and cricket team until 1995. He was a proud part of the cricket championship that the club enjoyed for 18 years out of 20 years (1973 - 1992) and 4 years in volleyball 3 a side Championship (1968 - 1972) until the traditional volleyball style was abolished in Tanzania in 1972.

His consistency and flamboyant style in the in the game of cricket provided him the opportunity to play for the Tanzania National Cricket team for 15 years from 1972 to 1986 and had the privilege to lead the side for 4 years. During his captainship in 1984, Tanzania won the championship of East and Central Africa after a lapse of 16 years; for which he was honored with the Tanzania National Award in 1984.

He was declared the Sportsman of the Year and awarded the prestigious Abul Fazal Trophy by the Africa Federation in 1975 and was bestowed the Abbasi Medal in 2008 by the then Chairman of Africa Federation, Alhaj Ramzan Nanji.

On his retirement from active sports, he decided to serve Union Sport Club in leadership position and was its Chairman, from 1996 to 2000 before he took up the Chairmanship of Ithna-Asheri Union from 2000 to 2004.

He was elected as the Vice Chairman of the Dar-es-Salaam Jamaat in 2004 and continued to hold the position for three consecutive terms under the Chairmanship of Alhaj Anwarali Rajabali Dharamsi. In February 2010 he took over from Alhaj Anwarali Dharamsi who became Chairman of Africa Federation, Mohamed Bhai completed the remainder of the term as President of Dar es Salaam Jamaat up till July 2010.

At the Federation he served as the Chairman of the Sports Council for the term 1998 - 2001 and was also a nominated Councillor for nine years. He remained available to the AFED Office Bearers whenever required. He was also a member of the Constitution Review Committee (CRC) of Africa Federation from 2007 to 2010.

Marhum Mohamed Bhai was an ardent supporter of Ithna-Asheri Union and Union Sports Club during his entire tenure in Dar es Salaam, he would leave no stone unturned to defend Ithna-Asheri Union and Unions Sports Club during its thick and thin. Being one of the stalwarts of Union Sports Club he was highly respected by the sports officials and sportsmen from different clubs within and outside the country.

AFED Chairman, Alhaj Amine Nassor had conveyed the following message on the sad demise of Alhaj Mohamed Nathoo:

"It is with a heavy heart that I convey this message of condolences to the family of Marhum Mohamed Bhai Nathoo. Mohamed Bhai played a crucial role in the sports arena of the community in Zanzibar and Dar es Salaam. Equally, he was dedicated and a committed member of our community having served in various capacities both in the Jamaat and in Africa Federation, his sudden death is saddening and has deprived the community of a kind hearted and devoted member, may Allah (SWT) grant him maghferat and grant solace to the bereaved family members, Ameen"

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




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# Africa Federation Tabligh Board (AFTAB)

# 5 MADRIS AND MORE TAKE UP THE MCE CURRICULUM.

The Africa Federation Tabligh Board (AFTAB) is pleased to announce that the MCE – Tarbiyyah Curriculum Training was implemented in 5 Madris across Africa, which include; Husayni Madrasah - DSM, Hussaini Madrasah - Mwanza, Al-Masoomeen Madrasah - Lubumbashi, Haidery Madrasah - Bujumbura, and Jafri Muslim Association - Lilongwe.

Up until 2022, 8 Madris across Africa had taken up the curriculum. These Madaris include Yadgaare Murtazawi Madrasah- Arusha, Haydari Madrasah-Nairobi, Husayni Madrasah Mombasa, Madressa Ahlulbayt - Mauritius and 4 Madris in Reunion. Tarbiyyah – a curriculum under MCE, whose vision is to nurture piety by enabling a learning environment that instills the values of the Quran and Ahlul Bayt as.

The Tarbiyyah curriculum is a spiral curriculum whereby all traditional Madrasah subjects i.e. Fiqh, Aqaid, Tarikh and Akhlaq are interlinked to give the students a better understanding of the religion without compartmentalizing it.

With VSS you can send your Alim, marriage counsellor or specialist a booking whenever you are near a laptop, tablet, or smartphone.

As seen in our first promotional poster, the easy to use design of the platform and the anonymity feature will enable users to easily navigate the platform.

#### WHY VSS?

With life taking its toll on all of us, everyone needs a guide, a place where they can share their problems and find solutions to them, somewhere to clarify our emotions or just to better understand ourselves.

Despite the well-established structure of governing bodies such as Jammats, Africa Federation and World Federation, our communities lack easy access to resources these governing bodies have established. With people's busy schedules it can be difficult to find time for your next marriage counselling appointment or because of your geographical location it can be difficult to meet our spiritual leaders. VSS bridges the gap that our communities have suffered from for too long. - transcends the need for human contact. Do not hesitate to seek help and assistance from this great platform that has been made by the community, for the community.

#### CHALO JANGBAR 2022 -THE ZANZIBAR HISTORICAL EXPEDITION

The Africa Federation's Archives Section organized the inaugural Zanzibar Historical Expedition, "Chalo Jangbar 2022," held from December 8th to 11th, 2022. The event was open to youth aged 16-20 from member Jamaats under the Africa Federation. With the aim of fostering interest in Khoja history, the expedition brought together 25 youth from Arusha, Dar es Salaam, Mombasa and Morogoro who were accompanied by 7 Mentors. Set in Zanzibar in the picturesque Tamani Villas, participants delved into the history of the Khoja community's migration to the island, its struggles, and development in religious, cultural, and social spheres.

During the expedition, the group visited Matam Bahrani and Kuwwatul Islam and Hujjatul Islam Mosques and learned their history. They explored sites like the Princess Salme Museum, historical places, met locals, and immersed in Zanzibar's culture.



The group also visited Professor Abdul Sheriff at the famous "Bustani" – (Garden) where they learnt the history of the challenges and dangers faced by the pioneers – The Dewji Jamal Family of Zanzibar during migration from India to East Africa. They also visited Mwanakwerekwe Cemetery to remember the past leaders, volunteers and members of the community who are buried there and Tamani Schools to understand the Foundation's role in education.

Alongside historical visits, workshops, and sightseeing, the group enjoyed FIFA matches, beach activities, and an interactive youth session facilitated by Br. Shabbirhussein Khalfan. The Archives Team had them create a 5-year community vision plan, leading to insightful presentations. The Chalo Jangbar Expedition's success promises future ventures.

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
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### **Central Health Board**

#### **MEDICAL SUPPORT**

From the time of the appointment of the board (29th August 2023) to 20th August 2023; The AFED through its Central Health Board has assisted various welfare patients from various Jamaats.

#### JAFFER FOUNDATION

The Central Health Board of Africa Federation (CHB-AFED) received gracious offer from the Jaffer Family Foundation of New York/UGI for assistance with subsidized cost of treatment for Cancer, Cardiac, Orthopedic surgeries, Kidney/Liver Transplant and other medical attention in Karachi, Pakistan (Subject to case acceptance from the doctors in Pakistan).

The Jaffer Family Foundation has also offered to host the patient/accompanies at an apartment to include food, transport, as well as help facilitate logistics between the patient, doctors and hospital in Pakistan free of cost for a two-week period.

Since the understanding between the Central Health Board of Africa Federation and Jaffer Family Foundation and the United Global Initiatives; a total of 10 patients have benefitted from this scheme.

#### MEETING WITH THE ACTING HIGH COMMISSIONER FOR PAKISTAN IN TANZANIA

Following the gracious offer by the Jaffer Family Foundation and the UGI, The Central Health Board made initiatives to ease the process of obtaining the visa for its members who intend to have medical attention in Pakistan.

A meeting was held on 17th January 2023 between Br. Abbas Sikander of Central Medical Board and the Acting High Commissioner, Honorable Muhammad Azam Bihan of the High Commission of Pakistan at the Pakistani consulate to discuss the visa process for its members.

The Central Health Board had worked on the life insurance schemes for the members; The following was achieved:

Awareness program for the Life Insurance Scheme was made for the community members.

The Q&A session was arranged with the Broker/Insurer

The life insurance scheme is:-

- 1. Affordable.
- 2. Wide coverage.
- 3. To have elder person covered in the said scheme (Age of 75 years)
- 4. And with add on benefits.

The benefits of the AFEDLife are: -

**Death Benefit** - USD 25,000 or USD 50,000 Or USD 100,000; Depending on the type of Scheme chosen.

**Funeral Benefit** – Payable USD 1,500 on any scheme (Insured Member).

**Critical Illness Benefit** – Benefit is payable only on the first-time diagnosis of a defined critical disease. Payable is 30% of the death benefit, depending on the Life Insurance scheme chosen. The type of the critical illness that is covered are Cancer, Paraplegia, Major Organ Transplant, Stroke, Coronary Bypass Surgery/Aorta Surgery, Kidney failure & Heart Attack.

**Permanent Total Disability (PTD)** – Payable when a member is totally disabled or incapacitated from engaging in his own occupation. 100% of the amount

to be paid upon PTD of the Life Insurance Scheme chosen by the member.

**Dependent Benefit** – USD 500 per person. (1 Spouse and maximum of 4 children (Children between the age of 21 to 25 years & should be studying)). Maximum cap 1000 per annum, per family.

Premium - The table below illustrates:

Premiums may change after the medical examination for the age category of 66 years to 75 years.

Further to the decision made, The Chairman of the Aminie Nassor announced that the Central Health Board is ready to implement the Life Insurance project on 5th July 2023. An email from the secretariat was sent to all the Jamaats.

#### **HEALTH INSURANCE**

Preliminary works has been done for the Health Insurance &/or Fund Management schemes; The project has been kept on hold, this shall be subject to the relevant support from constituent Jamaats on the Life Insurance Scheme (AFEDLife).

#### MEDICAL SCREENING

One of the key areas that we want to achieve is to have Community Health Screening for all our members across all the Jamaats. This will enable us to gather the data and also to define the road map of where we are, where we want to focus and the areas of our concentration.

Community health screening is a valuable resource for the early detection of illness. Several diseases can be efficiently managed if treatment and lifestyle changes are started at early stages. For instance, a Pap smear allows early detection of cancer in the cervix; early detection of high blood pressure could help prevent further heart disease. In both examples, early detection and management of the illness can ultimately save lives of our community members.

The screening program will enable us to detect potential health disorders or disease in people who do not have any signs or symptoms of any disease. Since the appointment of the Board, various efforts have been made to see the hospitals/health center

for the best possible quote for community health screening. The Central Health Board has been looking for an affordable and comprehensive medical screening for its members. The type of tests that the board is looking for are as follows:

The objective is to have a pool of specialized professionals in medical field, health education,





## FOCUS AREAS FOR THE TERM 2023 -2025

## Reinforcement of the Education Board's current Loan schemes and policies in place

The Education Board will strengthen its existing loan schemes and policies to ensure that financial barriers do not hinder students' access to quality education.

### Career Counseling and University Selection Framework

The Board will establish a robust career counseling framework within the community to guide students in making informed decisions about their future education and career paths. This initiative includes organizing workshops, creating Career FAQs, and setting up a career resource center. Additionally, the Board will forge partnerships with other institutions

to explore scholarship opportunities for deserving students.

## Continuing the Regional Education Forum Annually

Building upon the success of previous years, the Education Board will continue to hold the Regional Education Forum annually. This platform will bring together community school teams to share resources, information, and experiences. The Board aims to promote continuous engagement between schools to improve the quality of education services. ## Look into ways of strengthening our Financial Resources for Education in the community

#### ACCOMPLISHMENTS

**Published Newsletters:** Publishing frequent newsletters that are circulated through AFED Social media. These newsletters will serve as a valuable resource for students, particularly those exploring higher education options, diverse career paths, scholarship opportunities, and emerging trends in the job market.

Career Counseling: As part of the focus areas for the term, a Strong Interest Inventory Test and Career Counseling Session was held in Mombasa from 25th February to 27th February 2022. A total of 28 SII assessments were conducted for students studying in year 10 to year 13. Each student underwent the test and received one-to-one counseling by our certified career counselor and accredited SII practitioner – Sajidabai Master.

These sessions provide students and parents an opportunity to discuss specific career issues. An interactive talk and Q & A session were enlightening for parents and students providing them with valuable advice.

Such sessions are planned for each jamaat with a planned session for Kampala in September.



Regional Education Forum (REF): The REF was held from 18th to 20th November 2022 - at the Al Muntazir Islamic International School in Dar es Salaam - and was attended by board members and the Senior Leadership Teams (SLT) representing Al Muntazir Islamic International School, Nairobi Jaffery Academy, Jaffery Academy Mombasa & Jaffery Institute of Professional Studies, Jaffery Academy Arusha, Bilal Nursery & Primary School Kampala, Bilal Comprehensive School Temeke, KSIJ Lilongwe as well as representatives from the Africa Federation Education Board and the World Federation.

Key issues discussed included: Strategic Planning, Board Governance, Long-Term Infrastructure Planning, International Partnerships Accreditation, Staff Recruitment, Staff Training & Development, Curriculum Internationalization, CAT4 Assessments, Religious and Moral Implementation, and Tertiary Education - with individual sessions led by school leaders or board members focusing on future-facing discussions that nurtured partnerships among the schools and resulted in the sharing of best practices and resources among them.

Schools have committed to ensuring that the REF remains a vibrant, engaging platform - with regular

meetings among boards and SLTs of the various schools - and attendees have already begun planning for teacher exchanges, shared student activities, and working together on improved university access strategies.



## EDUCATION SUPPORT FROM VARIOUS DONORS:

Lady Fatemah Trust Pledges \$200,000 to Support Higher Education Loan Scheme

Lady Fatemah Trust, a U.K.-based non-profit, non-governmental, and faith-based humanitarian organization, is dedicated to empowering communities in the world's most impoverished regions, starting with mothers.

Through local partnerships, they focus on improving physical and mental health, facilitating access to fair education, and creating sustainable incomes. In Tanzania, Lady Fatemah Trust collaborates with organizations like Bilal Muslim Mission, contributing to health and education initiatives.

Mukhtar Bhai, representing Lady Fatemah Trust, pledged a generous sum of US\$200,000. This donation will be provided over four years, with US\$50,000 annually, towards supporting the Loan Scheme for Higher Education. The existing loan application procedures will remain in place.





# Central Bilal Board (CBB)

OVERSEEING BILAL MUSLIM MISSION OF TANZANIA, BILAL MUSLIM MISSION OF KENYA AND BILAL UGANDA ORGANISATION.

The Central Bilal Board (CBB) of the Africa Federation was formed in 2003 and its core activity is External Tabligh, to promote the religion of Islam and the Madh'ab of Ahlulbayt (a.s). CBB is the body supervising the various Bilal Muslim Missions.

CBB was revived in 2022 by the appointment of the Chairman - Alhaj Mohamedbhai Hemani on 24th August, 2022. Respective fields guided discussions across multiple domains, fostering an environment of intellectual growth and collaboration.

The high table, graced by esteemed dignitaries, added an aura of significance to the proceedings. Positioned at the high table were all the conference moderators. Joining them were the chair of AYN, Ali Khalfan, and the General Secretary. This high table ensemble represented the synergy between leadership and knowledge, setting a precedent for the conference's enriching and enlightening sessions.

#### **FORMATION OF THE BILAL BOARDS**

A resolution was passed in the Supreme Council Meeting held in Tanga in 1964, that first formed Bilal Muslim Mission of Tanzania, while Bilal Muslim Mission Kenya was formed thereafter in 1971. And Bilal Muslim Organization of Uganda in 2006.

In order to spread Islam and the Madh'ab of Ahlulbayt (a.s) in more countries in Africa, CBB has a plan for the expansion program that includes a longer-term strategy to cover more territories in Eastern Africa viz: Rwanda, Burundi, Malawi and Mozambique.

The role of CBB shall also be to provide support and guidance to the Missions on the matter of importance to include but not limited to:

- a) Statutory (legal) compliance requirements.
- b) Financial management procedures & reporting.
- c) Implementation of the Secretariat's recommendations.
- d) Centers and branches operation policies.
- e) Standard format of presentations of annual reports and accounts.
- f) Staff establishment and advising on procedures for employment etc.
- g) Preparing annual budgets and monthly expenditure controls (Missions).

#### WHAT WE STRIVE TO DO

Through the Bilal Muslim Mission, CBB as part of the long-term strategy to assist Bilal families through economic development programs, such as microfinance, horticulture programs, etc. to make

them self-sufficient. We also encourage Bilal Muslim Missions to regularly establish bridges of relationship with other faiths through inter-faith and intra-faith programs and maintain positive relationships with other communities in the areas of domicile where Bilal operates.

CBB shall also promote secular education side by side religious education (Hawza) where this is possible and sustainable.

CBB had the opportunity to organize, in collaboration with the AFED Secretariat in Dar es Salaam, to host a consultative meeting with Bilal Muslim Missions of Kenya and Tanzania at AFED Towers.

They covered several important agendas, such as, Challenges faced by the BMMT & BMMK, learning Best Practices from each Board, future of Tabligh in Africa, and how Bilal can play its role which was presented by our BMMT Chairman, Alhaj Hussein Karim.

The BMMK delegation visited Bilal Hawza at Temeke and BCS school the next day. They saw the operations of both the institutions and had discussions with the Hawza Mudiir Sheikh Muhammad Yusuf as well as the BCS Administrator Madam Sidika Karim. On that afternoon they held a meeting with the Bilal Tanzania Board at the Bilal HQ where the details of Bilal Tanzania projects were discussed in the field of Tabligh, Microfinance and education.

CBB also devised questionnaires to gain insights and attain a deeper understanding which shall assist the Board to have a database of ALL centers and help them to rationalize the Tabligh work being done and enable them to record the achievements of the individual centers since their inception.

We have managed to establish some Tableegh activities in Rwanda. CBB is supporting the Shia Organisation, AMIT, in Rwanda. The Africa Federation through the CBB, has helped recruit Mubaligheen in 10 centers and has printed and furnished these centers with Madrassah Teachers' Manuals in Rwandese Language.

Similar Tableegh work is in the process of being established in Malawi, working in collaboration with the Rab-e-Karim Trust in Lilongwe, Malawi.

## BILAL MUSLIM MISSION - TANZANIA TABLEEGH

#### Hawza:

At the moment, BMMT manages a total number of 693 students (Girls and Boys) in a total of 14 hawza/pre hawzas in Dar es salaam (1), Pwani (1), Ruvuma (1), Tanga (3), Arusha (1), Kilimanjaro (1), Kagera (1) and Kigoma (5).

Hawzatu Bilal Kibaha (Girls) is the new one, officially started in the middle of the first quarter of 2022 starting with 63 students. By June, 2022 the number of students stood at 103.

#### **EDUCATION**

#### **Islamic Corresponding Course**

Early, in the last quarter of 2022 we held the second graduation for our program "Islamic Corresponding Course".

The graduation was held at Bilal Comprehensive School's Husseiniya and was attended by students and invited guests.

A total of 84 students graduated and were awarded certificates.

This program was established by one of the BMMT founders - Allamah Sayyid Saeed Akhtar Rizvi in 1972 and has been active to date with the aim of conveying the teachings of Prophet Muhammad (s.a.w.w) and Ahlul-Bayt (a.s) regardless of geographical boundaries or age.

## **BILAL PRE-PRIMARY & PRIMARY SCHOOLS**

Currently, BMMT manages a total of 21 pre-primary schools and two primary schools.

Pre-primary schools are located in the regions of Coast & South zone, Tanga zone, Arusha, Mwanza (Lake) zone, Kagera (Bukoba) zone, Kigoma zone and Zanzibar zone with more than 687 students.

On the other hand, primary schools are; Bilal Comprehensive School located at Temeke, Dar Es Salaam with a total of 433 students (Pre-Primary & Primary) by June 2023, and Bilal Academy located in Zanzibar, a newly one - started operations in 2022. Until June 2023, had a total of 60 students (Pre-Primary & Primary).

We have a special program, "Fill My Cup" implemented in all our preschools where students are provided with free breakfast while at school. By June, 2023, a total of 47,542,000 Tanzanian shillings were disbursed to finance the program.

## SOCIAL WELFARE & HEALTH

#### Ramadhan Distribution 1444H | 2023

Food parcels were distributed to 5,833 families from BMMT centers and Non-BMMT centers across Tanzania.

The distribution was extended to seven orphanage centers in Dar Es Salaam and Coast regions.

The food parcel contained; Wheat flour, Maize flour, Cooking oil, Sugar, Rice, Beans, Spaghetti, Dates, and Salt.

#### **Emergency Food Relief**

#### **ECONOMIC UPLIFTMENT**

## Animal Rearing, Agricultural Support & SMEs schemes)

Since 2022, a total of 891 goats were distributed to a total of 302 individuals while a total of 43 cows were distributed to a total of 39 individuals as a loan.

Also, in the 2022/2023 financial year alone, a total of Tsh 91,025,000 was disbursed as a loan to a total of 376 people to boost small businesses including small scale farming, food vending, kiosk etc.

These projects are part of the mission's effort to encourage community participation in production activities and to eradicate poverty among Shia communities.

## BILAL MUSLIM MISSION - UGANDA

Eid- Ul- Adha (Festival of the Sacrifice), is celebrated on 10th day of Dhul Hijjah and this year it was on 26TH June 2023 as per Gregorian Calendar.

It honors the willingness of Hazrat Ibrahim (Abraham) to sacrifice his son Ismael as an act of obedience to God's command. Before Hazrat Ibrahim could sacrifice his son, however, God provided a lamb to sacrifice instead. In commemoration of this intervention, animals are sacrificed ritually all around the globe. Muslims all around the globe celebrate this festival by offering Namaz Eid UI Adha , Distributing the meat of their sacrificed goats within their family , friends and to the needy ones.

Alhamdulillah just like every year, Even this year we had the opportunity to arrange for distribution to the less privileged ones with open hands. With available resources, We served even more families than the previous year and all Members of Board from BMOU made every effort to reach out to all individuals. Our bilal volunteers traveled across the country and were able to distribute meat at 8 different locations to families across Uganda.

#### The 8 centers with the amount of goats as follows;

- 1) Kampala 24 Goats
- 2) Nansana 6 Goats
- 3) Kibundaire 15 Goats
- 4) Chankwanzi 22 Goats
- 5) Knakalanga 22 Goats
- 6) Kibuku 5 Goats
- 7) Jinja 8 Goats
- 8) Iganga 5 Goats

By the grace of Allah(S.W.T) BMOU was able to distribute 107 goats which was approximately 1400 Kgs of meat across these 8 centers, In the process helping out 740 Families. We pray to Allah(S.W.T) to give us the strength to distribute and support even more families in the coming years inshAllah.

## PLANS OF BMOU FOR MUHARRAM 1445/2023.

We called shaikhs from various centers around the country to our headquarters in kampala and then we briefed them about the importance of adding lessons from karbala in their lectures, where we discussed in depth the topics necessary for the community to derive lessons from and some of the topics we decided to select are as follows;

- 3. Imam Hussain(as) is for every religion and sect of the world because he teaches the lesson of humanity i.e We see people of different religious backgrounds visiting his shrine in Karbala.
- 4. Learning from Karbala on how to differentiate between Truth and False in today's world.
- 5. Put more light on the role of Sayyeda Zainab(sa) after Imam Hussain's(as) martyrdom to inspire the women of the community.

We shall be holding Majalis & Matam in various centers around the country for the 10 Days of Muharram where niyaz & tabarruk will be served and our headquarters in Kampala will also be hosting guest speakers as well.

Ashura program will be held in our Jinja Mosque where we shall have the amaal of Ashura and more than 250 of our Shia will gather from all nearby centers to commemorate the day of Ashura.

On the day of Ashura we will have a blood donation camp set up at Jinja mosque where more than 250 shias who will be gathering there will save lives in the name of Imam Hussain(as) by donating blood.

A procession will take place under the banner of Bilal on the 4th of Muharram in the city center where more than 700 of our shias will participate from centers around the country such as; Nakalanga, Jinja, mayuge and many others, Our various speakers are going to give speeches on topics related to Karbala in different languages such as; English, Luganda, Urdu & Kiswahili and our Noha reciters will recite latmiyas in the local languages.

#### Muharram 2023/1445.

The holy month of Muharram marks the beginning of the new Islamic year and the tragedy of Karbala, Every year the followers of Ahlulbayt(a.s) all around the world commemorate the martyrdom of Hussain Ibne Ali(a.s) the grandson of the Holy Prophet(s.a.w).

Alhamdulillah, Just like every year even this year the tragedy of Karbala was commemorated by the followers of Ahlulbayt(a.s) in Uganda, East Africa. Bilal Muslim Organization Uganda with all it's efforts and the help of Allah(s.w.t) made sure their community

around the country gathered and attended lectures to further learn about this tragedy and mourned for the grandson of the Holy Prophet(s.a.w) at their local Bilal centers. Our plans for this Muharram were as follows:

- To call Shaikhs from upcountry to H.Q for briefing.
- To hold majalis in various centers around the country for 10 days
- To host renowned guest speakers for lectures at our H.Q.
- To serve the community members with Niaz & Tabarruk after Majalis
- Hold a procession in the city center in the name of Imam Hussain(a.s)
- Ashura programme to be held at jinja mosque where more then 100 of our community members gathered from two centers and Amaal for Ashura took place where after musibah and matam Niaz was served.

Alhamdulillah we put in all our efforts to carry out these plans and with the help of Allah(s.w.t) we were able to do the following;

We began by calling our shaikhs from upcountry who would be giving lectures in Muharram at various centers and briefing them on the topics they should choose to give lectures on.

We asked them about the topics they had lectured on the previous year and after having sat with them we realized our community had an idea about the historical facts of karbala and knowing this we came to a conclusion of giving lessons from the story of karbala to our community, Our main topic being:

#### What Can We Learn from Karbala?

The following sub-topics were lectured on this year;

The story of martyr john in Karbala and how the religion of islam does not support the idea of racism but promotes brotherhood and unity regardless of race or color keeping in mind how Imam treated John during his last moments.



The story of Hurr. From this story our community learned how the Imam treated Hurr when he stopped the imam and the imam gave him, his army & his animals water and how it's never too late to repent and turn back to the right path.

We kept forward the holy land of Karbala in today's time informing the community about how Imam Al-Hussain(as) is not just for Muslims but people of all backgrounds and religions come to visit him and honor him at his shrine. Meaning his message was the message of Humanity.

How the story of Karbala teaches us to differentiate between Haqq & Batil, And how can we today recognize and stand against any injustice being done to anyone around us no matter how difficult it is.

We emphasized our shaikhs to shine more light on Sayyeda Zainab (s.a) this year for the women in our community to learn more about the role they can play in building a better society and lessons, Such as how important Hijab is for the women of our community.

With the grace of Imam Al-Hussain(a.s) these lectures turned out to be very beneficial amongst the community, To the extent that we started seeing results almost immediately and one of the heart touching incidents we witnessed was; After one of the lectures on Hazrat Hurr and the story of how him and his army stopped the caravan of Imam(a.s) but the Imam(a.s) ended up serving him, his army and his animals water despite the fact Hurr and his army behaved in a bad manner with the Imam(a.s) and his caravan Inspired one of the community members so much that, they ended up bringing more than 50 bottles of drinking water to be distributed in the next majlis amongst the bilal community.

Karbala still inspires us and we are very hopeful that these lectures must have had a great impact upon not only our community but everyone who must have attended them. We pray to Allah(s.w.t) that these lectures inspire many more people and end up being beneficial to the community.

Imam Hassan al-Askari (a.s.), describes the yateem of Ahlul Bait (a.s.) as those devoid of or denied the knowledge of the path of Ahlul Bait (a.s.). The purpose of Tabligh therefore, is to invite them to the Deen of Islam as taught by the Holy Household.

Bilal Muslim Mission of Kenya has been working dedicatedly for the cause of Allah (SWT) since its inception 52 years ago, with the blessings of the Almighty. We also acknowledge the invaluable support of our partners, individual and corporate, in enhancing these efforts. We pray the Almighty (SWT) accepts their contributions and increases their Barakaat.

In addition to religious activities centered around the mosque, madrassa and Husseiniyah, Bilal Kenya works towards enhancing Muslim dignity through supporting holistic human development. Bilal Kenya fully supports 15 Shia Centres in and around the Coast region and partly supports a further 40 independent Centers around the country. Total population support includes 5,000 families and 1,000 children in nursery schools. Following are brief descriptions of some of Bilal Kenya's activities in diverse sectors carried this past year.



#### Water, Sanitation and Hygiene

Concentration is on improving access to clean water and sanitation facilities in underserved communities. 12 fully operational solar powered water desalination plants producing up to 2000 liters of potable water per hour have already been installed at various Bilal Kenya centers, opening up a new era of health and safety for the people. This gives meaning and reality to the practice of the principles of taharat.

Additionally, we have embarked on projects to renovate the existing washrooms at our centers as well as to construct entirely new facilities. These initiatives coupled with hygiene education programs have promoted healthier living conditions and the reduction of waterborne diseases.



#### **Education**



Enhancing learning opportunities for the children is a priority. The pre-primary classrooms were fully renovated this year, adding new windows, ceiling, fans and other electrical fittings. New classroom furniture and playground equipment completed the refreshing new atmosphere for the learners.

Furthermore, students were provided with computer tablets which are a highly effective supplemental tool when used under the guidance of their teachers.

#### **Women's Empowerment**

Our Economic Upliftment Program is primarily dedicated to the social and economic empowerment of women. Microfinance projects provided women with the means to start and expand their small businesses. Financial literacy training and access to credit has enabled numerous women to generate income, contribute to their households and foster economic independence. Tailoring classes have also been very popular in some locations. The EUP program is also being opened up for male youths.

#### **Food Security and Nutrition**

School feeding remains a proven and effective method to improve food security and nutrition. This program is a crucial nutrition and learning support net for children. We successfully completed two phases of the Lunch Program this year which enabled the provision of fresh nourishing and well-balanced lunches to thousands of children.

The Fill My Cup program provides a healthy cup of millet and milk porridge to the little learners at Break Time

Other food distribution programs included the distribution of Family Food Parcels and Iftar Provisions to Mosques during the Holy Month of Ramadan.







#### Health

Health initiatives focus on preventive care advice and providing essential medical services to vulnerable communities. Mobile Medical camps are organized at Bilal centers monthly. Patients receive the vital care and medication they need free of cost.



#### **Tabligh and Media**

This is undoubtedly a core function of the mission and we work passionately to ensure its fulfillment. This year several Mosques were fully renovated and given a facelift, making them welcoming places for communal worship.

We have experienced exciting growth in our media department. All programs held at the Bilal Hall in Mombasa during the months of Ramadan and Muharram were live streamed on our digital media platforms in an effort to engage the wider community and foster a sense of unity. Some of the programs held at other centers were also available to a global audience.



# Housing Development Board

The housing development board consists of 8 members in the current term 2022 – 2025; Lead by Alhaj Akil Hirji (Chairman), other members include Sr. Shakera Dhanani (DSM), Sr. Zakiya Khamisa (DSM), Sr. Ayman Dewji (DSM), Br. Yusuf Jiwa (Mombasa), Br. Navazaly Molu (Antananarivo), Br. Ashfak Vallimamod (Antananarivo), and Br. Salim Raza Dodhia (Malawi).

The vision of the board has been thought of and stands for "Building a Vibrant, Sustainable and Progressive Community."

Moreover, the mission of the board is "Together we shall progress."

The vision and mission are in line with our current AFED Chairman Alhaj Amine Nassor's manifesto.



### **Q&A WITH ZAHEER SHAH**



## Performance Analyst for Tottenham Hotspur Football Club

### Tell us a bit about yourself and your role at Tottenham?

I'm currently in my tenth season working in football. I started off working in the Brentford Academy, before moving to the First Team, where I spent three incredible seasons in a really unique environment. I was exposed to so much that has really helped my career to this day. In 2019, I moved to Tottenham, with my current role being the Lead First Team Performance Analyst. My role mainly consists of focussing on the tactical elements of our game model, and analyzing our matches and training in great detail, in order to provide actionable feedback to the coaches and players.

## How has your experience been working in the Premier League for one of the most renowned clubs in England?

In a word, incredible. Of course, the stadium and training ground are exceptional but coming from Brentford where the facilities weren't as grand – I learnt to appreciate the people that made the soul of the club. I love working with the team at Spurs because the level is so high, that you can never afford to stand still. Working in the Premier League was always a dream of mine – I was never good enough to become a player but I never wanted to work in anything other than Football, so to be in this position, working in the best league in the world for one of the best clubs, is really special to me.

### You have worked under various managers, what is the biggest learning for you?

I've been really lucky to work under some incredible managers. From Dean Smith, who was the first to really give me my voice in a high-performance environment. He taught me the value of leadership through humility and kindness and was an amazing manager of people.

Thomas Frank, who was his assistant coach, replaced him as manager. He never put a limit on how much support I could provide. He gave me a lot of autonomy in terms of how I wanted to work and really gave me the passion to work on "us" - our team, our model of play, our philosophy and beliefs regardless of the opponent.

When I moved to Tottenham, I briefly worked under Mauricio Pochettino. I learnt so much from him and his staff about what high standards really are. They were really open to sharing their knowledge with me and I understood very quickly how detail and structure in the way we work can always compensate for any gap in quality and finance.

My first longer term manager at Tottenham was José Mourinho, someone who I looked up to when I was growing up. I could speak a lot about his abilities as a coach and manager, but his personality was something that really stood out to me – someone

who had achieved so much in his career was still willing to give time, energy and patience to someone like me was one of the biggest highlights of my career.

After him was Antonio Conte, a purebred winner and an incredibly passionate coach. During his tenure, I started to gain more seniority in my role, so working closely with him was a big learning experience in terms of his knowledge of the system he wanted to play, but also his continuous improvement in the "small details that moved the final result".

Now I'm working under Ange Postecoglou, who has already left an incredible impression on the staff and players at the club, with his energy and footballing ideas. I'm continuing to learn from coaches whom I feel I share a similar footballing ideology with, and it's something I'm really enjoying.

## With every career there have been challenges, what's been your biggest challenge pursuing this career path?

Starting this career was a challenge in itself. I never had a role model to look up to, to say that I wanted to be like them. Having to convince my family that this was a viable option took a lot of work but thankfully, through hard work and perseverance, I feel like I've justified the risks I took earlier in my life.

The on-going challenges really come in the form of the effect working in Football has had on my social life. I've been really lucky to marry someone who's been incredibly understanding and supportive, as well as having friends who understand what I'm trying to achieve. When you're working in a career that demands a large majority of your attention for 46 weeks/10 months of the year continuously, then you appreciate the support a lot more.



#### What is your take on the rise in sporting careers? Do you think there's huge potential for our community members to pursue this?

Of course, I don't believe there are many jobs out there that we, as a community, should not endorse. Being "visible" gives us the platform to send our own message to the world that we are all connected, and that we share common values and enjoyment. It should fill us with pride to see people who look like us achieve great things in any walk of life, and sports should be no different.

Previously, people may have seen that becoming a football player was the only path to take in the sport, but there are other options such as becoming an analyst, a scout, a nutritionist, a sports scientist, a club doctor etc, and these careers are just as viable for women too.

You were featured by the Premier League for an episode focussing on South Asians in Football, an inspirational moment for you and the community in general. What's your message to those following your journey?

Follow your passion. As generic as that sounds, I couldn't imagine my life without having it being fuelled by something I'm deeply passionate about. Understand that success is never in a straight line but always be ready to take any opportunity given to you.



If you look back a decade or so ago, you would see that sports in our community was always passion driven and never a career path. Making it to the top level seemed impossible. Do you feel that the advancement of technology has opened up more sporting careers and opportunities that our community can tap into?

I believe so, social media especially has allowed anyone from anywhere to tap into the industry to the level where, if you're lucky, you can get noticed.

## Everyone reading this will probably start looking closely into the Spurs dug out for you! What's your normal match day routine like?

A typical matchday would consist of meetings prior to kick off, either with the team or with individual players. Once the game begins, I would be sat up in the press area - which is an elevated position to give me a better vantage point of what's happening on the pitch. I capture the game on my laptop, where I'll be analyzing live and providing feedback to the coaches on the bench via radio. I also prepared a short video for the manager to show the players at half time consisting of key points - good actions to continue, and areas of improvement.

Once the game ends, I watch it back with a fresh mind (and less emotion), and prepare a comprehensive analysis of the game to then be shown to the coaches and players the following day. A normal matchday, depending on the kick-off time, tends to be a 12–16-hour work day.

## You have been part of many historical matches. Which one stands out for you?

It's hard to pick just a single match because football doesn't allow you to dwell on positive or negative results for too long! The one match that will always hold the fondest memory for me is the first home game I attended after joining Tottenham – it was a Champions League game against Bayern Munich. We lost that game, but the reason it holds a close place in my heart is the feeling I had, having just come from Brentford, to be a part of a European game in the best stadium in the world and to hear the famous Champions League anthem literally brought a tear to my eye.

# Analyzing world class players and coming up with strategies to combat them is a tough task. Who would you say is the most difficult opponent (team) and player you have had to analyze?

The Premier League is blessed with some of the best coaches in the world now, there isn't a single weak team in the league anymore. As difficult as it is to prepare for a game against Manchester City, it's equally as difficult to prepare for games against some of the "smaller" teams in the league due to their own strengths – be it their intricate playing style or their physicality and presence.

#### What initiated the start of your journey?

However, when I send my orders they're sent with a courier and it reaches in 2 days, my daughter stays in Dar so that makes it easier to ship the products & hence that makes her house the collection point.



The origins of this remarkable endeavor trace back to 1986 when Murabbi Anwer Bhai Merali and Mama Keki initiated Free Eye Camps across Tanzania. Operating under the name 'Bilal Free Eye Camps,' they undertook the noble task of providing eye care to thousands of patients, with up to 15,000 patients receiving assistance each year. In 2020, a pivotal decision was made by the members of KSIJ Dar es Salaam. The impact of this endeavor was swiftly realized in the year 2022. A staggering 21,739 patients received care, and 873 surgeries were successfully performed. 




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### Learn what you need to know before you invest in a virtual currency

### What Is Cryptocurrency?

A cryptocurrency is a digital or virtual currency secured by cryptography, which makes it nearly impossible to counterfeit or double-spend. Most cryptocurrencies exist on decentralized networks using blockchain technology—a distributed ledger enforced by a disparate network of computers.

A defining feature of cryptocurrencies is that they are generally not issued by any central authority, rendering them theoretically immune to government interference or manipulation.

### **KEY TAKEAWAYS**

### **Understanding Cryptocurrencies**

Cryptocurrencies are digital or virtual currencies underpinned by cryptographic systems. They enable secure online payments without the use of third-party intermediaries. "Crypto" refers to the various encryption algorithms and cryptographic techniques that safeguard these entries, such as elliptical curve encryption, public-private key pairs, and hashing functions.

Central to the appeal and functionality of Bitcoin and other cryptocurrencies is blockchain technology. As its name indicates, a blockchain is essentially a set of connected blocks of information on an online ledger. Each block contains a set of transactions that have been independently verified by each validator on a network.

Every new block generated must be verified before being confirmed, making it almost impossible to forge transaction histories. The contents of the online ledger must be agreed upon by a network of individual nodes, or computers that maintain the ledger.

Experts say that blockchain technology can serve multiple industries, supply chains, and processes such as online voting and crowdfunding. Financial institutions such as JPMorgan Chase & Co. (JPM) are using blockchain technology to lower transaction costs by streamlining payment processing.

### **Types of Cryptocurrency**

Many cryptocurrencies were created to facilitate work done on the blockchain they are built on. For example, Ethereum's ether was designed to be used as payment for validating transactions and opening blocks. When the blockchain transitioned to proof-of-stake in September 2022, ether (ETH) inherited an additional duty as the blockchain's staking mechanism. Ripple's XRP is designed to be used by banks to facilitate transfers between different geographies.

Because there are so many cryptocurrencies on the market, it's important to understand the types of cryptocurrencies. Knowing whether the coin you're looking at has a purpose can help you decide whether it is worth investing in—a cryptocurrency with a purpose is likely to be less risky than one that doesn't have a use.

Most of the time, when you hear about cryptocurrency types, you hear the coin's name. However, coin names differ from coin types. Here are some of the types you'll find with some of the names of tokens in that category:

Utility: XRP and ETH are two examples of utility tokens. They serve specific functions on their respective blockchains.

ransactional: Tokens designed to be used as a payment method. Bitcoin is the most well-known of these.5

Governance: These tokens represent voting or other rights on a blockchain, such as Uniswap.6

Platform: These tokens support applications built to use a blockchain, such as Solana.7

Security tokens: Tokens representing ownership of an asset, such as a stock that has been tokenized (value transferred to the blockchain). MS Token is an example of a securitized token. If you can find one of these for sale, you can gain partial ownership of the Millenium Sapphire.8

If you find a cryptocurrency that doesn't fall into one of these categories, you've found a new category or something that needs to be investigated to be sure it's legitimate.

### **Are Cryptocurrencies Legal?**

Fiat currencies derive their authority from the government or monetary authorities. For example, each dollar bill is backstopped by the U. S. government.

But cryptocurrencies are not backed by any public or private entities. Therefore, it has been difficult to make a case for their legal status in different financial jurisdictions throughout the world. It doesn't help matters that cryptocurrencies have primarily functioned outside most existing financial infrastructure.

### In the US

The legal status of cryptocurrencies creates implications for their use in daily transactions and trading. In June 2019, the Financial Action Task Force (FATF) recommended that wire transfers of cryptocurrencies should be subject to the requirements of its Travel Rule, which requires AML compliance.

### **IMPORTANT!**

Although cryptocurrencies are considered a form of money, the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) treats them as financial assets or property for tax purposes. And, as with most other investments, if you reap capital gains selling or trading cryptocurrencies, the government wants a piece of the profits. How exactly the IRS taxes digital assets—either as capital gains or ordinary income—depends on how long the taxpayer held the cryptocurrency and how they used it.

In the United States in July 2023, courts ruled that cryptocurrencies are considered securities when purchased by institutional buyers but not by retail investors purchased on exchanges.

Enthusiasts called it a victory for crypto; however, crypto exchanges are regulated by the SEC, as are coin offerings or sales to institutional investors. So, crypto is legal in the U.S., but regulatory agencies are slowly gaining ground in the industry.

### **FAST FACT**

As of August 2023, El Salvador is the only country to accept Bitcoin as legal tender for monetary transactions. In the rest of the world, cryptocurrency regulation varies by jurisdiction.



### In Asia

Japan's Payment Services Act defines Bitcoin as legal property.13 Cryptocurrency exchanges operating in the country are required to collect information about the customer and details relating to the wire transfer. China has banned cryptocurrency exchanges, transactions, and mining within its borders, but has a Central Bank Digital Currency (CBDC). India was reported to be formulating a framework for cryptocurrencies, but until it is enacted, crypto is not yet illegal. Exchanges are free to offer cryptocurrencies.

### In Europe

Cryptocurrencies are legal in the European Union. Derivatives and other products that use qualify "financial cryptocurrencies must as 2023, instruments." In June the European Commission's Markets in Crypto-Assets (MiCA) regulation went into effect. This law sets safeguards and establishes rules for companies or vendors providing financial services using cryptocurrencies.

### **Are Cryptocurrencies Safe Investments?**

Cryptocurrencies have attracted a reputation as unstable investments due to high investor losses due to scams, hacks, bugs, and volatility. Although the underlying cryptography and blockchain are generally secure, the technical complexity of using and storing crypto assets can be a significant hazard to new users.

In addition to the market risks associated with speculative assets, cryptocurrency investors should be aware of the following risks:

User risk: Unlike traditional finance, there is no way to reverse or cancel a cryptocurrency transaction after it has already been sent. By some estimates, about one-fifth of all bitcoins are now inaccessible due to lost passwords or incorrect sending addresses.16

Regulatory risks: The regulatory status of some cryptocurrencies is still unclear, with many governments seeking to regulate them as securities, currencies, or both. A sudden regulatory crackdown could make it challenging to sell cryptocurrencies or cause a market-wide price drop.

Counterparty risks: Many investors and merchants rely on exchanges or other custodians to store their cryptocurrency. Theft or loss by one of these third parties could result in losing one's entire investment.

Management risks: Due to the lack of coherent regulations, there are few protections against deceptive or unethical management practices. Many investors have lost large sums to management teams that failed to deliver a product.

Programming risks: Many investment and lending platforms use automated smart contracts to control the movement of user deposits. An investor using one of these platforms assumes the risk that a bug or exploit in these programs could cause them to lose their investment.

Market Manipulation: Market manipulation remains a substantial problem in cryptocurrency, with influential people, organizations, and exchanges acting unethically.

Despite these risks, cryptocurrencies have seen a significant price leap, with the total market capitalization rising to about \$1.2 trillion. Despite the asset's speculative nature, some have created substantial fortunes by taking on the risk of investing in early-stage cryptocurrencies.

### **Advantages and Disadvantages of Cryptocurrency**

Cryptocurrencies were introduced with the intent to revolutionize financial infrastructure. As with every revolution, however, there are tradeoffs involved. At the current stage of development for cryptocurrencies, there are many differences between the theoretical ideal of a decentralized system with cryptocurrencies and its practical implementation.



### **Advantages**

### **Advantages Explained**

Cryptocurrencies represent a new, decentralized paradigm for money. In this system, centralized intermediaries, such as banks and monetary institutions, are not necessary to enforce trust and police transactions between two parties. Thus, a system with cryptocurrencies eliminates the possibility of a single point of failure-such as a large financial institution setting off a cascade of global crises, such as the one triggered in 2008 by the failure of large investment banks in the United States.

Cryptocurrencies promise to make transferring funds directly between two parties easier without needing a trusted third party like a bank or a credit card company. Such decentralized transfers are secured by the use of public keys and private keys and different forms of incentive systems, such as proof of work or proof of stake.

Because they do not use third-party intermediaries, cryptocurrency transfers between two transacting parties can be faster than standard money transfers. Flash loans in decentralized finance are an excellent example of such decentralized transfers. These loans, which are processed without backing collateral, can be executed within seconds and are used in trading. Cryptocurrency investments can generate profits. Cryptocurrency markets have skyrocketed in value over the past decade, reaching almost \$2 trillion. As of July 2023, Bitcoin was valued at more than \$565 billion in crypto markets.18

The remittance economy is testing one of cryptocurrency's most prominent use cases. Cryptocurrencies such as Bitcoin serve as intermediate currencies to streamline money transfers across borders. Thus, a fiat currency is converted to Bitcoin (or another cryptocurrency), transferred across borders, and subsequently converted to the destination fiat currency without third-party involvement.

### **Disadvantages Explained**

Though they claim to be an anonymous form of transaction, cryptocurrencies are pseudonymous. They leave a digital trail that agencies like the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) can follow.

This opens up the possibility for governments, authorities, and others to track financial transactions.

Cryptocurrencies have become a popular tool with criminals for nefarious activities such as money laundering and illicit purchases. The case of Dread Pirate Roberts, who ran a marketplace to sell drugs on the dark web, is already well known. Cryptocurrencies have also become a favorite of hackers who use them for ransomware activities.

In theory, cryptocurrencies are meant to be decentralized, their wealth distributed between many parties on a blockchain. In reality, ownership is highly concentrated. For example, just 100 addresses hold roughly 12% of circulating bitcoin and total value.

One of the conceits of cryptocurrencies is that anyone can mine them using a computer with an Internet connection. However, mining popular cryptocurrencies require considerable energy, sometimes as much energy as entire countries consume. The expensive energy costs and the unpredictability of mining have concentrated mining among large firms whose revenues run into billions of dollars. For example, only 98 (2%) of the 4,882 Bitcoin blocks opened from Dec. 29, 2022, to Jan. 29, 2023, were opened by unknown addresses—the other 98% were opened by mining pools.

Though cryptocurrency blockchains are highly secure, off-chain crypto-related key storage repositories, such as exchanges and wallets, can be hacked. Many cryptocurrency exchanges and wallets have been hacked over the years, sometimes resulting in the theft of millions of dollars in coins. Cryptocurrencies traded in public markets suffer from price volatility, so investments require accurate price monitoring. For example, Bitcoin has experienced rapid surges and crashes in its value,

climbing to nearly \$65,000 in November 2021 before dropping to just over \$20,000 a year and a half later.24 As a result, many people consider cryptocurrencies to be a short-lived fad or speculative bubble.

### **How Do You Buy Cryptocurrencies?**

You can purchase cryptocurrency from popular crypto exchanges such as Coinbase, apps such as Cash App, or through brokers. Another popular way to invest in cryptocurrencies is through financial derivatives, such as CME's Bitcoin futures, or other instruments, such as Bitcoin trusts and ETFs.

### What Is the Point of Cryptocurrency?

Cryptocurrencies are a new paradigm for money. They promise to streamline existing financial architecture to make it faster and cheaper. In addition, their technology and architecture decentralize existing monetary systems and make it possible for transacting parties to exchange value and money independently of intermediary institutions such as banks.

## THE FUTURE OF AI: HOW ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE WILL CHANGE THE WORLD

**AI** is constantly changing our world. Here are just a few ways AI will influence our lives.

If it feels like the future of AI is a rapidly changing landscape, that's because the present innovations in the field of artificial intelligence are accelerating at such a blazing-fast pace that it's tough to keep up.

Indeed, artificial intelligence is shaping the future of humanity across nearly every industry. It is already the main driver of emerging technologies like big data, robotics and IoT — not to mention generative AI, with tools like ChatGPT and AI art generators garnering mainstream attention — and it will continue to act as a technological innovator for the foreseeable future.

Roughly 44 percent of companies are looking to make serious investments in AI and integrate it into their businesses. And of the 9,130 patents received by IBM inventors in 2021, 2,300 were AI-related.

It seems likely that AI is going to (continue to) change the world. But how, exactly?

### The Evolution of Al

Al's influence on technology is due in part because of how it impacts computing. Through Al, computers have the ability to harness massive amounts of data and use their learned intelligence to make optimal decisions and discoveries in fractions of the time that it would take humans.



Al has come a long way since 1951, when the first documented success of an Al computer program was written by Christopher Strachey, whose checkers program completed a whole game on the Ferranti Mark I computer at the University of Manchester.

Since then, AI has been used to help sequence RNA for vaccines and model human speech, technologies that rely on model- and algorithm-based machine learning and increasingly focus on perception, reasoning and generalization. With innovations like these, AI has re-taken center stage like never before — and it won't cede the spotlight anytime soon.

### What Industries Will AI Change?

There's virtually no major industry that modern AI — more specifically, "narrow AI," which performs objective functions using data-trained models and often falls into the categories of deep learning or machine learning — hasn't already affected. That's especially true in the past few years, as data collection and analysis has ramped up considerably thanks to robust IoT connectivity, the proliferation of connected devices and ever-speedier computer processing.

"I think anybody making assumptions about the capabilities of intelligent software capping out at some point are mistaken," David Vandegrift, CTO and co-founder of the customer relationship management firm 4Degrees, said.

With companies spending billions of dollars on Al products and services annually, tech giants like Google, Apple, Microsoft and Amazon spending billions to create those products and services, universities making Al a more prominent part of their curricula and the U.S. Department of Defense upping its Al game, big things are bound to happen. "Lots of industries go through this pattern of winter, winter, and then an eternal spring," former Google Brain leader and Baidu chief scientist Andrew Ng told ZDNet. "We may be in the eternal spring of Al." Some sectors are at the start of their Al journey, others are veteran travelers. Both have a long way to go. Regardless, the impact Al is having on our present day lives is hard to ignore.

### AI IN TRANSPORTATION

Transportation is one industry that is certainly teed up to be drastically changed by Al. Self-driving cars and Al travel planners are just a couple of facets of how we get from point A to point B that will be influenced by Al. Even though autonomous vehicles are far from perfect, they will one day ferry us from place to place.

### AI IN MANUFACTURING

Manufacturing has been benefiting from Al for years. With Al-enabled robotic arms and other manufacturing bots dating back to the 1960s and 1970s, the industry has adapted well to the powers of Al. These industrial robots typically work alongside humans to perform a limited range of tasks like assembly and stacking, and predictive analysis sensors keep equipment running smoothly.

### AI IN HEALTHCARE

It may seem unlikely, but AI healthcare is already changing the way humans interact with medical providers. Thanks to its big data analysis capabilities, AI helps identify diseases more quickly and accurately, speed up and streamline drug discovery and even monitor patients through virtual nursing assistants.



### AI IN EDUCATION

Al in education will change the way humans of all ages learn. Al's use of machine learning, natural language processing and facial recognition help digitize textbooks, detect plagiarism and gauge the emotions of students to help determine who's struggling or bored. Both presently and in the future, Al tailors the experience of learning to student's individual needs.

### AI IN MEDIA

Journalism is harnessing AI too, and will continue to benefit from it. One example can be seen in The Associated Press' use of Automated Insights, which produces thousands of earning reports stories per year. But as generative AI writing tools, such as ChatGPT, enter the market, questions about their use in journalism abound.

### AI IN CUSTOMER SERVICE

Most people dread getting a robo-call, but Al in customer service can provide the industry with data-driven tools that bring meaningful insights to both the customer and the provider. Al tools powering the customer service industry come in the form of chatbots and virtual assistants.

The Impact of AI on Society

### **HOW AI WILL CHANGE WORK**

During a lecture at Northwestern University, Al expert Kai-Fu Lee championed Al technology and its forthcoming impact while also noting its side effects and limitations. Of the former, he warned: "The bottom 90 percent, especially the bottom 50 percent of the world in terms of income or education, will be badly hurt with job displacement ... The simple question to ask is, 'How routine is a job?' And that is how likely [it is] a job will be replaced by Al, because Al can, within the routine task, learn to optimize itself. And the more quantitative, the more objective the job is—separating things into bins, washing

dishes, picking fruits and answering customer service calls—those are very much scripted tasks that are repetitive and routine in nature. In the matter of five, 10 or 15 years, they will be displaced by AI."

In the warehouses of online giant and Al powerhouse Amazon, which buzz with more than 100,000 robots, picking and packing functions are still performed by humans — but that will change. Lee's opinion was echoed by Infosys president Mohit Joshi, who told the New York Times, "People are looking to achieve very big numbers. Earlier they had incremental, five to 10 percent goals in reducing their workforce. Now they're saying, 'Why can't we do it with one percent of the people we have?'"

On a more upbeat note, Lee stressed that today's Al is useless in two significant ways: it has no creativity and no capacity for compassion or love. Rather, it's "a tool to amplify human creativity." His solution? Those with jobs that involve repetitive or routine tasks must learn new skills so as not to be left by the wayside. Amazon even offers its employees money to train for jobs at other companies.

"One of the absolute prerequisites for AI to be successful in many [areas] is that we invest tremendously in education to retrain people for new jobs," said Klara Nahrstedt, a computer science professor at the University of Illinois at Urbana–Champaign and director of the school's Coordinated Science Laboratory.

She's concerned that's not happening widely or often enough. Marc Gyongyosi, founder of Onetrack.AI, is even more specific.

"People need to learn about programming like they learn a new language," he said. "And they need to do that as early as possible because it really is the future. In the future, if you don't know coding, you don't know programming, it's only going to get more difficult."

While many of those who are forced out of jobs by technology will find new ones, Vandegrift said, that won't happen overnight. As with America's transition from an agricultural to an industrial economy during the Industrial Revolution, which played a big role in causing the Great Depression, people eventually got back on their feet. The short-term impact, however, was massive.

"The transition between jobs going away and new ones [emerging]," Vandegrift said, "is not necessarily as painless as people like to think."

Mike Mendelson, a learner experience designer for NVIDIA, is a different kind of educator than Nahrstedt. He works with developers who want to learn more about AI and apply that knowledge to their businesses.

"If they understand what the technology is capable of and they understand the domain very well, they start to make connections and say, 'Maybe this is an Al problem, maybe that's an Al problem," he said. "That's more often the case than 'I have a specific problem I want to solve."

### THE NEAR FUTURE OF AI

In Mendelson's view, some of the most intriguing Al research and experimentation that will have near-future ramifications is happening in two areas: "reinforcement" learning, which deals in rewards and punishment rather than labeled data; and generative adversarial networks (GAN for short) that allow computer algorithms to create rather than merely assess by pitting two nets against each other. The former is exemplified by the prowess of Google DeepMind's AlphaGo Zero, the latter by original image or audio generation that's based on learning about a certain subject like celebrities or a particular type of music.

On a far grander scale, AI is poised to have a major effect on sustainability, climate change and environmental issues. Ideally and partly through the use of sophisticated sensors, cities will become less congested, less polluted and generally more livable. "Once you predict something, you can prescribe certain policies and rules," Nahrstedt said. Such as sensors on cars that send data about traffic conditions could predict potential problems and optimize the flow of cars. "This is not yet perfected by any means," she said. "It's just in its infancy. But years down the road, it will play a really big role."



### AI AND PRIVACY RISKS

Of course, much has been made of the fact that Al's reliance on big data is already impacting privacy in a major way. Look no further than Cambridge Analytica's Facebook shenanigans or Amazon's Alexa eavesdropping, two among many examples of tech gone wild. Without proper regulations and self-imposed limitations, critics argue, the situation will get even worse. In 2015, Apple CEO Tim Cook derided competitors Google and Meta for greed-driven data mining.

"They're gobbling up everything they can learn about you and trying to monetize it," he said in a 2015 speech. "We think that's wrong."

Later, during a talk in Brussels, Belgium, Cook expounded on his concern.

"Advancing AI by collecting huge personal profiles is laziness, not efficiency," he said. "For artificial intelligence to be truly smart, it must respect human values, including privacy. If we get this wrong, the dangers are profound."


Plenty of others agree. In a 2018 paper published by UK-based human rights and privacy groups Article 19 and Privacy International, anxiety about AI is reserved for its everyday functions rather than a cataclysmic shift like the advent of robot overlords.

"If implemented responsibly, AI can benefit society," the authors wrote. "However, as is the case with most emerging technology, there is a real risk that commercial and state use has a detrimental impact on human rights."

The authors concede that the collection of large amounts of data can be used for trying to predict future behavior in benign ways, like spam filters and recommendation engines. But there's also a real threat that it will negatively impact personal privacy and the right to freedom from discrimination.

Preparing for the Future of AI

### THE POSSIBILITIES OF ARTIFICIAL GENERAL INTELLIGENCE



Speaking at London's Westminster Abbey in late 2018, internationally renowned AI expert Stuart Russell joked (or not) about his "formal agreement with journalists that I won't talk to them unless they agree not to put a Terminator robot in the article."

His quip revealed an obvious contempt for Hollywood representations of far-future AI, which tend toward the overwrought and apocalyptic. What Russell referred to as "human-level AI," also known as artificial general intelligence (AGI), has long been fodder for fantasy. But the chances of its being realized anytime soon, or at all, are pretty slim.

"There are still major breakthroughs that have to happen before we reach anything that resembles human-level AI," Russell explained.

Russel also pointed out that AI is not currently equipped to fully understand language. This shows a distinct difference between humans and AI at the present moment: Humans can translate machine language and understand it, but AI can't do the same for human language. However, if we reach a point where AI is able to understand our languages, AI systems would be able to read and understand everything ever written.

"Once we have that capability, you could then query all of human knowledge and it would be able to synthesize and integrate and answer questions that no human being has ever been able to answer," Russell added, "because they haven't read and been able to put together and join the dots between things that have remained separate throughout history."

This offers us a lot to think about. On the subject of which, emulating the human brain is exceedingly difficult and yet another reason for AGI's still-hypothetical future. Longtime University of Michigan engineering and computer science professor John Laird has conducted research in the field for several decades.

"The goal has always been to try to build what we call the cognitive architecture, what we think is innate to an intelligence system," he says of work that's largely inspired by human psychology. "One of the things we know, for example, is the human brain is not really just a homogenous set of neurons. There's a real structure in terms of different components, some of which are associated with knowledge about how to do things in the world."

That's called procedural memory. Then there's knowledge based on general facts, a.k.a. semantic memory, as well as knowledge about previous experiences (or personal facts) which is called episodic memory. One of the projects at Laird's lab involves using natural language instructions to teach a robot simple games like Tic-Tac-Toe and puzzles. Those instructions typically involve a description of the goal, a rundown of legal moves and failure situations. The robot internalizes those directives and uses them to plan its actions. As ever, though, breakthroughs are slow to come — slower, anyway, than Laird and his fellow researchers would like.

"Every time we make progress," he says, "we also get a new appreciation for how hard it is."

### IS AGI A THREAT TO HUMANITY?

More than a few leading Al figures subscribe (some more hyperbolically than others) to a nightmare scenario that involves what's known as "singularity," whereby superintelligent machines take over and permanently alter human existence through enslavement or eradication.

The late theoretical physicist Stephen Hawking famously postulated that if Al itself begins designing better Al than human programmers, the result could be "machines whose intelligence exceeds ours by more than ours exceeds that of snails." Elon Musk believes and has warned that AGI is humanity's biggest existential threat. Efforts to bring it about, he has said, are like "summoning the demon." He has even expressed concern that his pal, Google co-founder Larry Page could accidentally shepherd something "evil" into existence despite his best intentions.

Even Gyongyosi rules nothing out. He's no alarmistwhen it comes to AI predictions, but at some point, he says, humans will no longer need to train systems; they'll learn and evolve on their own.

"I don't think the methods we use currently in these areas will lead to machines that decide to kill us," Gyongyosi said. "I think that maybe five or 10 years from now, I'll have to reevaluate that statement because we'll have different methods available and different ways to go about these things.

While murderous machines may well remain fodder for fiction, many believe they'll supplant humans in various ways.

Oxford University's Future of Humanity Institute published the results of an AI survey. Titled "When Will AI Exceed Human Performance? Evidence from AI Experts," it contains estimates from 352 machine learning researchers about AI's evolution in years to come



There were lots of optimists in this group. By 2026, a median number of respondents said, machines will be capable of writing school essays; by 2027 self-driving trucks will render drivers unnecessary; by 2031 AI will outperform humans in the retail sector; by 2049 AI could be the next Stephen King and by 2053 the next Charlie Teo. The slightly jarring capper: By 2137, all human jobs will be automated. But what of humans themselves? Sipping umbrella drinks served by droids, no doubt.

Diego Klabjan, a professor at Northwestern University and founding director of the school's Master of Science in Analytics program, counts himself an AGI skeptic.

"Currently, computers can handle a little more than 10,000 words," he said. "So, a few million neurons. But human brains have billions of neurons that are connected in a very intriguing and complex way, and the current state-of-the-art [technology] is just straightforward connections following very easy patterns. So going from a few million neurons to billions of neurons with current hardware and software technologies — I don't see that happening."

### **HOW WILL WE USE AGI?**

Klabjan also puts little stock in extreme scenarios — the type involving, say, murderous cyborgs that turn the earth into a smoldering hellscape. He's much more concerned with machines — war robots, for instance — being fed faulty "incentives" by nefarious humans. As MIT physics professors and leading Al researcher Max Tegmark put it in a 2018 TED Talk, "The real threat from Al isn't malice, like in silly Hollywood movies, but competence — Al accomplishing goals that just aren't aligned with ours."

That's Laird's take, too: "I definitely don't see the scenario where something wakes up and decides it wants to take over the world," he said. "I think that's science fiction and not the way it's going to play out." What Laird worries most about isn't evil Al, per se, but "evil humans using Al as a sort of false force multiplier" for things like bank robbery and credit card fraud, among many other crimes. And so, while he's often frustrated with the pace of progress, Al's slow burn may actually be a blessing.

"Time to understand what we're creating and how we're going to incorporate it into society," Laird said, "might be exactly what we need."

But no one knows for sure.

"There are several major breakthroughs that have to occur, and those could come very quickly," Russell said during his Westminster talk. Referencing the rapid transformational effect of nuclear fission (atom splitting) by British physicist Ernest Rutherford in 1917, he added, "It's very, very hard to predict when these conceptual breakthroughs are going to happen."

But whenever they do, if they do, he emphasized the importance of preparation. That means starting or continuing discussions about the ethical use of AGI and whether it should be regulated. That means working to eliminate data bias, which has a corrupting effect on algorithms and is currently a fat fly in the AI ointment. That means working to invent and augment security measures capable of keeping the technology in check. And it means having the humility to realize that just because we can doesn't mean we should.

"Most AGI researchers expect AGI within decades, and if we just bumble into this unprepared, it will probably be the biggest mistake in human history. It could enable brutal global dictatorship with unprecedented inequality, surveillance, suffering and maybe even human extinction," Tegmark said in his TED Talk. "But if we steer carefully, we could end up in a fantastic future where everybody's better off — the poor are richer, the rich are richer, everybody's healthy and free to live out their dreams."

# **4 DESIGN MISTAKES THAI**

## o deas ACTION ACTION

You're a savvy customer—most people are these days. Whenever you visit a new website or experience new marketing or advertising, you scroll through a subconscious list of criteria that helps you make buying decisions. You ask yourself, is this company trustworthy? Do I feel comfortable giving them my money? You make lightning fast judgments about the marketing you see.

### But how fast is fast?

Dr. Gitte Lindgaard at Carleton University wanted to find the answer to that question, so she ran a study. She flashed web pages in front of users for 1/20th of a second. Then she had the participants rate the web pages they saw.



Her research pointed to something amazing: customers form first impressions about marketing in as little as 50 milliseconds. 50 milliseconds.

Customers make judgments about marketing before they've even had a chance to process what it's trying to convey. There's no cognitive effort involved in this first impression; it's completely visual and based almost entirely on emotion and feeling.

### More than meets the eye: quality design extends beyond typography and color

People automatically assume that marketing success is all about looks, but the visible aspects of your marketing initiatives are actually only half of the equation.

Successful marketing is a combination of tangible and intangible factors:

### **Tangible factors**

Include anything that your customers can see. This includes visual elements of your design, like your choice of colors and fonts, and the quality of

your images and message. The quality of your product or service is also a key tangible factor. If you say you're selling diamonds, but are really selling glass, the most essential tangible factor will be in question—as will your trustworthiness.

### **Intangible factors**

Are all about the credibility, authority, trust and expectations customers place on your company, product, or service. Your underlying marketing message is a key intangible factor.

The intangible factors of successful marketing design include:

**Creating relatable content.** We like people who are like us. With the right design elements you send a signal to your target audience that says, "Hey, I'm just like you and I can help."

**Meeting expectations.** Customers often have unrealistic expectations of your business. You can use design to demonstrate who you are as a company and what customers can expect to receive from your services (hopefully relieving their fears and defusing their objections along the way).

Values and beliefs. It is essential to understand your target audience's personal values. Including these values and beliefs in your design will help to connect to your consumers and confirm your trustworthiness.



Your design should reflect your company's values. Are you here to help, inspire or amuse and distract (or something else?) Design by Dasocreative.

When intangible and tangible design factors are used together it creates harmony in the design. Your marketing works as intended and you're able to attract your target audience to your business. When this happens it's a beautiful thing.

But few designers understand the nuances—and importance—of these two factors. Unfortunately, they aren't taught in design school. And on the business side most entrepreneurs are unaware that there are two sides to design, which makes an imbalance of tangible and intangible factors difficult

to address. When left unattended, design that skews more tangible or intangible can lead to some serious design mistakes that will directly influence your marketing initiatives.

In fact, these mistakes can actually increase customer resistance. When the design isn't right, consumers can shift from a neutral "meh" to a firm "no way." Before you know it, they're looking elsewhere for the products and services they desire. You can avoid losing customers by understanding some of the most common design mistakes that can negatively influence your marketing results.

### Mistake #1: A tangible/intangible conflict distorts your marketing message

Imagine you see a deals-of-the-day website that's advertising an exclusive offer on "designer shoes." They claim the shoes are handmade in Turkey and have won many awards.

You do a Google search to confirm.

What do you find? A big fat nothing. The "designer" doesn't have a website, there's no information about the awards they've won, and there's nothing that states the shoes are actually from Turkey.

Would you pay a premium price for those shoes? For most savvy shoppers the answer would be "no." How can a customer be expected to trust the advertising for this deals-of-the-day website? The intangible (marketing message) doesn't match up with the tangible (reality).

Marketing should communicate a fluid and honest message. If you're leaning on prestige, customers expect to see credentials, pedigree or lineage. They want credible information that validates your claim.

### How do you avoid this problem?

Choose a value word or personality word to anchor your business. This word will guide your marketing messages and give customers a sense of what the business is all about.

GEICO is a really good example of a value word in action: humor. Its caveman-themed commercial was a huge hit.

### How does a personality word influence design?

It creates boundaries that a designer or marketing team must work within. At each step of the design process you must ask: does this font support our personality word? Do these colors? What about the images?

Your personality words may be "reliability," "education," "luxury," or "fun." Whatever it is, be sure to support it at every stage of the design process.

### Mistake #2: Your message and visuals are a mismatch

Image conflicts create doubt. When the tangible and intangible presentation factors in your business aren't in sync customers get nervous and start asking probing questions.

"If you're a \_\_\_\_\_ why don't I see \_\_\_\_?"
"If you say you're \_\_\_\_ why don't you look like \_\_\_\_?"

Customers expect your marketing and value proposition to be in sync. If you're selling a luxury car it shouldn't look like this:

If you're selling a top-of-the-line product your website shouldn't look like this:

The words and visuals that you present to the world say a lot about your business and create customer expectations. If you're a prestigious law firm for example, customers expect you to:

- Charge premium prices
- Hire Ivy League graduates
- Be headquartered in a prestigious location
- Market and promote your business in a quality manner

All of the design elements in your business, the tangible and intangible, need to match.

### How do you avoid this problem?

Start by creating a list of intangible factors. These are the associations you want customers to make when they think of your business, product or service.

Let's say you're selling to first-time moms. Your intangible factors could be peace-of-mind, feeling rested or safety and security. Designing your marketing materials around these factors means that using flaming skulls and lots of black in your design is pretty much out of the question.

Including intangible factors into your marketing initiatives directly influences your design decisions.

### Mistake #3: You ignore customer expectations

As consumers, we expect personal trainers to be in shape, bankers and attorneys to dress well and drive nice cars, and artists to be eccentric and creative.

Customers also have expectations about your business. They arrive at your website or marketing materials believing that you will meet these expectations. They expect you to make them happy or at least satisfy their needs. When you don't do that they become unhappy and respond negatively by either giving your competition their business or posting a terrible review on Yelp and/or their social media channels.

### How do you avoid this problem?

You expose their expectations by first figuring out where they are coming from. When you know the origin of a customer's expectations you will be better equipped to meet them.

Customer's expectations can stem from:

**Word-of-mouth.** A longtime customer may have spoken highly of your business or services to a prospective new customer. If so, they've set the bar quite high making it easier for you to disappoint.

**Past experiences.** Has your customer been burned by one of your competitors? Has his or her overall experience in your industry been positive or negative?

**Marketing messages.** Are your competitors making outlandish promises? Are you offering more or less than what they've been promised?

**Personal needs.** Do your customers expect your product or service to be customized to their unique needs?

Reach out to a few customers and ask these questions. The answers may surprise you!

### Mistake #4: Your design is too heavy or too light

It's common for marketing design to be too heavy—or too light. Often design will receive the art piece treatment, with complex or intricate visuals or there will be no visual elements at all.

### **Beauty without benefit**

Here's a page from a microsite that was made for Toyota.

It's pretty isn't it?



What do they expect you to do here?

But the question is: what are you supposed to do on this website and why?

No idea, right?

Customers lose interest in websites like these—they're pretty but unclear. This confusion creates resistance towards your business because nobody enjoys feeling discombobulated or out of place.

### **Ethos without excitement**

This website is a wall of text. It's light on design, focused almost completely on the message.



This site is focused on the message alone.

### Overwhelming, no?

When the design doesn't give direction, the consumers can feel as if they've been hit with a ton of information. They don't know what they should look at first and they don't know how to navigate through all of the data that's being presented.

### How do you avoid this problem?

Your personality word is the way to avoid teetering over into marketing that overemphasizes text or overemphasizes the visual. Once you isolate your word—it could be anything from "ultimate" to "soothing" "energizing" to to "playful" "practical"—spend some time really exploring its tangible and intangible aspects. Again, the tangible elements are things like color, typography, layout, and visuals. How do these elements represent your personality? If your personality word is "exciting" you may want to stay away from tangible design elements that are drab, dull or safe.

You'll then want to clarify the intangible elements of your personality word, e.g. the behavior, values, expectations and culture that are associated with the word. Your design should reflect these elements. Consider organizations such as Craigslist,

The Drudge Report, Berkshire Hathaway and Plenty of Fish. Their utilitarian, no-frills design emphasizes practicality, efficiency and straightforwardness.



Craigslist's utilitarian look is no-frills, but effective. Would this drab look work for BMW, Loreal or Hermes? Not so much.



#### What is Arbaeen?

Arbaeen originates from the Arabic term translated as "fortieth", in Indian culture it is referred to as Chalismo/Chalisma- symbolizing forty days since a deceased passed away. Arbaeen is a mourning period for Imam Hussain (PBUH), where mourners gather from across the world in Iraq to honor the sacrifice and mourn over the family of Imam Hussain and his companions over the atrocities that were committed to them by the enemies on the tenth day of Muharram, the tragic day of Ashura.

Millions gather in Iraq for an average of seven to ten days, beginning from the tenth of Safar and walk towards Karbala to Imam Hussain (PBUH), an eighty kilometer walk that could take anything between a day to five days to complete, it is perhaps the largest banquet in the world- with Iraqis and foreigners coming together to showcase their generosity for the love of Imam Hussain (PBUH).

Throughout the path, one gets to witness "Mawakibs"- a station serving either food, drinks, a shelter to rest, and in some instances you would witness families on the streets pleading with the pilgrims to join them home for a meal, or for a pilgrim to grace their house with their presence, be it for a glass of water or for a place to stay.

### Why is it so special?

The walk epitomizes humanity, love, generosity, sacrifice, selflessness, a global village, a living proof that millions can come together, united under the banner of love, to restore faith in humanity- that we can all put our differences aside and exist peacefully if we focus on loving each other.

"Did you see how everyone is out there helping each other, everyone being patient with each other, looking after each other's needs and helping strangers? This is what life will be like when the Imam reappears, this is the ultimate goal of being human, this is where we would like to be as Muslims."

Imagine experiencing what life would be under the Imam like? Pretty special!

Have a clear mindset, and intentions of what you would like to achieve from this trip.


















### CHEESY MALAI CHICKEN

Recipe by Chop It



Chicken skewers marinated in a creamy but spicy mixture, topped with WHITE SAUCE, and then MOZZARELLA cheese - yum!

### Here's the recipe:

Marinate 1KG chicken breast cut into small cubes with:

1/2 cup Yogurt-

1 TBSP Cream-

1 TSP Salt & 1 TSP Pepper-

1 TBSP Ground Chilli-1/2 TSP Cumin Powder-

1/2 TSP Garam Masala-

1TSP Mustard Powder (you can use regular mustard)-

Place the chicken in skewers (you can also add some peppers and onions between the chicken pieces)

### **White Sauce:**

Heat 2 TBSP Butter, once it's melted add 2 TBSP flour and mix it until it turns light brown. Then gradually add 1 cup Milk whilst stirring (if it's lumpy then whisk it) then add 1 TSP Salt & 1 TSP Pepper, 2 TSP Chilli flakes and a bit of coriander and then let it cook and thicken. If it gets too thick, add more milk.

Heat up oil in a shallow frying pan (large enough to fit the chicken skewers), keep turning it every minute until all parts are evenly cooked. Whilst still in the pan, pour the white sauce over each stick and top it with loads of mozzarella. Once the cheese melts, take it off the pan and enjoy! Top with coriander and chili flakes.

# **AJAM - MKATE WA UFUTA**

In Memory of Marhuma Tasnimbai M Jivraj

### Ingredients:

- 4 cups of flour
- 2 teaspoons of yeast
- Salt, to taste
- Water, for binding
- Ghee

### Method:

- 1. In a mixing bowl, combine flour, yeast, and salt according to your taste preferences.
- 2. Gradually add water to the mixture, adjusting until the dough reaches the desired consistency.
- 3. Allow the batter to rise until it's visibly expanded.
- 4. Heat a non-stick pan over high flame.
- 5. Sprinkle some water onto the pan.
- 6. Pour the batter onto the pan (tava) and spread it out to your desired thickness.
- 7. Sprinkle sesame seeds on top of the batter.
- 8. Cook for a few minutes, then carefully flip the tava to cook the other side.
- 9. Once both sides are golden brown, remove the ajam from the pan.
- 10. Sprinkle ghee over the cooked ajam.

Serve the hot ajam alongside curry, seekh kebab, or enjoy it plain.




**MOSQUE BIRYANI**



Azhar believes that in respect of taking up a job there are no restrictions of gender based professions. This motivated him to know and learn the skill of stitching and starting up a business that included stitching, cutting, designing and searching for raw materials from scratch.

Azhar has designed t-shirts of different styles, he has designed side bags, string bags, make up pouches, toiletry bags, laptop sleeves, mugs, jackets, ties, trousers, waistcoats, ladies cardigans and hoodies all from Khangas and Kitenges. He has marketed his business well and has managed sell his stuff in Dar es salaam, Mwanza, Arusha, India, Canada and UK as well

Zuri.tz is also the only business in Dar es Salaam, Tanzania that started making tie and dyes from scratch. Azhar designs tie and dye t-shirts single handedly which are very famous as every design is unique.

Azhar's business has taught him all the pros and cons of a business and gave him new and different ideas in a business. However, he also faced challenges as during his business startup the Pandemic hit. He had to make sure that he advertised his business online to be able to reach out to the right buyers during the Covid-19 phase and this created an income that could sustain his personal expenses and create savings during this period and on.

In the beginning he went through losses, disagreements with suppliers, rise in price for kitenges because of demand and rise in price in fabric. However, this also thought him how to deal with different kinds of suppliers and the ways of marketing and communications for and with his customers. # THE WAY FORWARD FOR ISLAMIC UNITY

PRESENTED BY ALHAJ MANZOORALI KANANI 12TH FEBRUARY 2005



To address the subject "The way forward for Islamic Unity" let me begin with the Magna Carta of Human Fraternity and unity as taught in the The Holy Quran:

O mankind, We have created you from a male and female; and We have made you into tribes and sub-tribes for the sake of easy recognition. Verily, the most honorable among you, in the sight of God, is the most righteous among you. Surely, God is All-Knowing, All-Aware. (49:13)

Thus the Universal feature ofIslam is that it views man's comparative worth not in his race, ethnicity,

culture, color, creed, wealth, influence, position, stature, etc., BUT BY HIS Attainment of righteousness, doing right and eschewing wrong.

Allma Igbal, presents this so beautifully:

"Tum syed bhi ho Mirza bhi ho Afghan bhi ho tum sabhi kuchh ho batao ki musalmanbhi ho"

 $\mbox{ lqbal }$  uses the word "Syed" to represent the caste system

The word "Mirza" to represent the ruling elite

The word"Afghan" to represent the differences in Muslims based on region, language, and race.

When Iqbal poses the question, **batao ki musalman bhi ho** - "Tell me, are you Muslim too?" he implies that those who feel proud and superior compared to other fellow Muslims because of these labels attached to their names (and not because other fellow Muslims because of these labels attached to their names (and not because of Taqwa), they are not entitled to be called true Muslims.

Vital for all Muslims to develop a better understanding of Islam.

To Facilitate greater understanding of the richness of theIslamic experience and the diversity of the Muslim community.

That Muslims need to engage in the political system and civil society.

To do this requires a unified Muslim Community. In today's global village Inter-racial, inter-ethnic heritage of Muslims poses a challenge to us.

No of Mosques Increasing No of Hajis Increasing No of Muslim organizations growing

Whenever some differences arose among Muslims in one organization, they created another one and built another mosque.

"Masjid to banadi shab bhar mein imaan kehararat walon ne man apna purana papi hay barson mein namazi ban nasaka"

"Those with fervor in their faith built the mosque in a night, but the heart is sinful and did not prostrate years."

John Esposito, professor of religion and international affairs, considers this a major challenge.

"Despite the shared beliefs and rituals that unite Muslims, the transnational unity of Islam disintegrates in the face of ethnic, linguistic and nationalist differences and conflicts."

Unity of Purpose is exposed by Allma Iqbal in the following verse:

"Manf-e-at ek hai is qaum ki nuqsaan bhi ek ek hi sab ka nabi deen bhi iman bhi ek harame paak bhi Allah bhi Quran bhi ek kuchh bari baat thi hote jo Musalmanbhi ek"

"There is one common gain and one common loss for all Muslims. One Prophet (PBUH) for all and one Iman for all. One Ka'aba, oneAllah and one Quran for all. How great it would be if Muslims Also were one!" Do we have a chance of Real Unity or are we just mouthing platitudes?

Is Muslim unity only a dream that cannot be fulfilled?

Is all this talk of Muslim unity just 'talk'?

Islam may have once unitedMuslims but present reality makes it impossible.

Is this just nice talk, which makes Muslims feel good but an unrealistic goal that cannot be achieved. One Way of Creating unity

Rally people around yourself and create a fictitious unity by generating hate in them.

But unity achieved by instigating hatred of another group and highlighting the differences is not a lasting unity.

Seventy years ago, a mad charismatic charlatan in Germany could incite nationalism and instill pride in the defeated Germans of the WWI by inflaming their racial superiority.

Can the enlightened world fall into the same trap?

Arab Nationalism of Saddam is a case in point.

Ascribing sanctity and eternity to limited and incomplete human interpretations.

### Learn to appreciate others' points of view

Islam is very broad and wide, contrary to popular belief, and you can find a range of scholarly views on issues as diverse as Our scholars have shown such tolerance towards differing views on various issues, who are we, to express intolerance for another point of view?



### **Criticize Constructively**

Insensitive criticism is a sure way to create anger, hurt and dissension.

We must learn the etiquette of criticism, whether it is towards individual Muslims or our leaders.

Knowing and implementing this will not only help solve problems in a practical manner, but it will also lead to a greater sense of brother and sisterhood in the Ummah

### Avoid taking a strong position on minor points

Get your priorities in order.

There are some aspects of Islam that are more important than others.

Avoid making secondary issues of the faith factors of division in our communities.

Ensure that small differences do not kill Muslim unity.

### Do not Judge others harshly

If a person is expressing ideas that are not in line with Islamic values,he must be gently corrected. Reaching out across ethnic boundaries.

All of our institutions, functions must become more ethnically diverse and open to the needs and concerns of Muslims of all backgrounds.


We must ensure that no Muslim, regardless of their ethno- cultural background, feels shut out of the community, ignored or neglected.

# THE LIFE OF ANVERALI M. RAJPAR

My adulthood journey of life started in 1957 when I flew to London to pursue studies in Chartered Accountancy. When I decided to pursue this qualifica-tion, Chartered Accountancy was unknown in our Khoja Community. I think it would not be wrong to say that I was the first Khoja Isnasheri to have decided on this qualification.

For one to qualify as a Chartered Accountant, one has to be articled for 5 years to a practicing Chartered Accountant in the U.K. Articleship means you work full time, except three afternoons a week, when you attend lectures organized by private tutorship tailored to the syllabus set by The Institute of Chartered Accountants in England & Wales, which would be the examining body to award the certificate after passing its Inter and Final Exams.

During the time I was seeking articleship, it was a daunting task to get one due to high demand for articleship. However, by the Grace of Allah SWT, I was lucky to get an articleship within a few weeks of my arrival in the U.K. I was articled to Mr. Sidney Quick, a principal in the small firm of Chartered Accountants, operating in the name of Maidment, Penney, Quick & Co.

My work entailed auditing, bookkeeping, preparing Income Tax Returns and making tea, as I was the junior most staff at the firm.

At that time, we were a handful of Khoja Isnasheri students staying at a hostel known as "East Africa House", which was under the auspices of East African Community. At that time, we did not have a single Shia Mosque or Imambarga in London or the whole U.K. However, our Love for Azadari prompted a few of us to form "East African Isnasheri Union" (EAIU) which organized majalis at whoever had a suitable space to accommodate a few of us. I am proud that I was one of the founders of EAIU and was elected as its first Hon. Secretary. I can proudly say that EAIU was the nucleus into which the first K.S.I Jamaat London came into existence.

During the 5 years, I was articled, I pursued my studies diligently, attending afternoon lectures regularly and studying during evenings and weekends. It appeared that I made the right choice of career as I was very much interested in all the subjects forming the syllabus of Chartered Accountancy. As a result of my interest in studies and my hard work, Allah SWT, in His infinite mercy, thought it fit to reward me with outstanding results. As stated above, The Institute of Chartered Accountants in England & Wales "(of which I am a Fellow and entitled to use designation of "F.C.A. (England & Wales)" sets the exams, which are held in England & Wales only. Hence, at any one time, there were about 1800 to 2000 students sitting from all over the world, which at that time, had a passing rate of not more than 30%.

At the Intermediate exam, I stood 14th overall and at the Final Exam, I stood 4th overall. I also stood 1st in Executorship Accounts, for which I was awarded 'Plender' Prize in Executorship Accounts. Thus, I qualified as a Chartered Accountant at the age of 24 in May 1962.

In mid-1962, I returned to Tanganyika, as it was then known, before merger with Zanzibar to form "TANZANIA". On my return I commenced a practice at Lindi under the name of RAJPAR & Co. Chartered Accountants. In 1963, I branched out to Dar es Salaam, having bought a practice of a Mr. Chatwani, who was practicing as QUICK, CHATWANI & CO and incidentally was my senior at Maidment, Penney, Quick & Co., where I was articled.

In 1964, I was joined by my friend, Praful Davda and we changed the firm's name to RAJPAR, DAVDA & Co. and opened branches at Arusha and Moshi.

In 1971, both Praful and myself decided to emigrate to London and Karachi respectively. Consequently, we transferred the practice to Bihari Tanna, who has since retired to the U.K. This firm changed hands several times, but is still in existence under the name and style of Balakrishna Sreekumar & Co., Certified Public Accountants.

During the time 1962 - 1971, when I was in Tanzania, I took an active part in community affairs, first at Lindi and then at Dar es Salaam Jamaat. Whilst in Dar es Salaam I joined its Managing Committee, eventually

ending up as Hon. Secretary of K.S.I Jamaat of Dar es Salaam in 1964. During my tenure at Dar es Salaam Jamaat, I spearheaded a housing project for its members on Bibi Titi Street, opposite our community graveyard. 3 buildings (Mohamedi Flats, Tauheed Flats and Alavi Flats) were built and sold to members at cost. These buildings still exist today with 150 flats and are occupied by community members on ownership basis. My Secretary-ship also saw purchase of a piece of land near the Old Imambargha, on which today stands the Gents' Imambargha.

I also served as Councilor of the Federation of K.S.I Jamaats of Africa from 1962 to 1970. On emigrating to Karachi in 1971, when I was 33 years old, I established a shipping agency company under the name of General Shipping Agencies (Pvt) Ltd a company which still exists and is now being ably managed by my son, Mohammed.

In 1986, when a new bulk port under the name of Mohamed Bin Qasim was inaugurated in Pakistan, a company known as Khan Brothers & Associates (Consortium) (Pvt) Ltd was awarded a sole terminal operator license to handle all bulk cargoes like Rice, Pig Iron, Wheat, etc. This company was awarded a Certificate of Appreciation by the Government of Pakistan and Port Qasim Authority for excellent performance. This company ceased its opera-tions in 1996, when other companies were successful in the tender process. I had invested in this company and acted as its Chairman during its existence.

In 1996, I decided to return to Tanzania for two reasons. One to give a free hand to Mohammed to run the Pakistan business, and I do not regret that decision as the company has progressed and prospered well under his lead-ership. Thanks to Allah SWT.

The second reason was to re-establish my ties with the country of my birth, which had undergone transformation from a socialist to a free economy. On my return, I immediately established General Shipping Agencies (T) Ltd to undertake shipping agency business. I am grateful to Conti Lines of Belgium who immediately appointed this company as its agents in Tanzania. This agency was the nucleus of my shipping business in Tanzania.

In 2002, I merged my Tanzania business with that of Seaforth Shipping (Kenya) Ltd to form Seaforth General Agencies Ltd whose management I took over as its managing director. I was fortunate to have good partners from Sea-forth Shipping (Kenya) Limited, as a result of which this company is still oper-ating in Tanzania and is ranked as one of leading independent shipping agency companies in Tanzania. Whilst in Dar es Salaam I had the privilege of being elected as Chairman of Dar es Salaam Merchants Chamber, a Chamber of Commerce. catering for SMEs. Various Chambers of Commerce operating in Tanzania (and there were many in existence at that time) were encouraged by the Government to unite under one umbrella, so that the business community could engage the Government with one voice.

Hence, came into existence "TANZANIA PRIVATE SECTOR FOUNDATION (TPSF). I was one of the founders of TPSF. I served as a Director on the TPSF Board for 6 initial years, spearheading the cause of the Private Sector.

In order to co-ordinate and enhance Private Public Partnership (PPP), a stat-utory body under the name of Tanzania National Business Council (TNBC) was statutorily formed under Gazette Notice. TNBC had equal membership of the Government and TPSF, under the chairmanship of H.E. the President of Tanzania. Similarly, I was privileged to serve as a member of the TNBC Executive Committee for 6 years. In recognition of my services, the then President of Tanzania was pleased to recognize my services.



I am also a founder member of Tanzania Shipping Agents Association (TASAA), a Trade Association of all shipping agents in Tanzania. I served as a Member of the Management Council and then as a Vice Chairman.

In the year 2000, I joined the Rotary Club of Dar es Salaam. I was elected as President for one term and was its Hon. Treasurer for a number of years till my retirement in 2018. In recognition of my services to the Club, Rotary Club of Dar es Salaam conferred Honorary Membership on me.

For a short time, I was a resident of Kenya, when I had the privilege of serving as Chairman of Jaffrey Sports Club - Nairobi from 1994 to 1996.

Now let me turn to my social and community services in Pakistan, where I spent prime years of my life from the age of 33 to 58 years from 1971 to 1996. Early 1970s saw mass exodus from Uganda due to expulsion of Asians by the then President of Uganda, Iddi Amin, and from Tanzania due to economic policies of the Government. Most of the exodus was towards Western coun-tries like the U.K., U.S.A,

Canada and Europe but Pakistan and India also received a fair share of immigrants. Zainabia Trust (under my chairmanship) provided accommodation to these migrants.

During 1979 to 1981, I was elected overwhelmingly as Hon. Secretary of Khoja (Pirai) Shia Isnasheri Jamat of Karachi, which is the largest Khoja Jamaat in the whole word. The migrants from East Africa were new entrants into the Khoja Isnasheri Community of Karachi, who wholeheartedly welcomed us and encouraged us to settle in our new homeland. We, the East Africans, attended the majalis and prayers at Mehfil-e-Khorasan at Soldier Bazaar. Most of us were living in or around the PECHS area.

Our residence at PECHS made it a little inconvenient for us (especially for ladies) to attend our religious requirements at Meh-fil-e-Khorasan, so late Hussein J. Dhanji and late Aboo Khakoo and myself took the lead to try to establish a religious Center in PECHS. In 1973 we were successful in getting a house on rent to use as an Imambargha. However, a rented house was not convenient or suitable for our long term needs. We, therefore, in our quest for a suitable place to build our own center, late Nooraly Mohamedali Alibhai Ramji who had emigrated from Uganda to Karachi much earlier than 1971 kindly offered us a plot of 2000 sq. yards, in the prime area of PECHS as a donation. Having secured this land, we convinced Late Mr. Saleem Thariani, a renowned Architect in our community to prepare drawings and tender documents. I am happy to acknowledge Saleem's gratis services, for which he did not charge us any fees. Simultane-ously, we started a donation drive to funds for construction. Alhamdullilah completed the structure in 1975 and the Centre known as Mehfil-e-Murtaza was officially opened by the late Jumabhai Haji, a renowned philanthro-pist from Tanzania who had earlier settled in Pakistan.

Having fulfilled our requirement for a religious center, the next target was education, so I spearheaded the formation of Al Murtaza School (AMS) in a rented premises in the PECHS area. From rented premises, we have now Mashaallah progressed to four purpose built school campuses catering to about 2300 students - boys and girls from KG to Matric. The environment is strictly Islamic. The school is guided by competent people who form the Board of Governors. I am happy that I have served on this Board as a Vice Chairman and Board member from inception to my migration in 1996. Now enters Mr. Jameel Yusuf, S.St. who is Hon. Secretary on the Board. He has taken AMS to greater heights, unseen in any community school. The academ-ic results are phenomenal with 100 percent passes at all Board Exams, mostly in 'A' grade. Thanks to Jameel, all Governors and academic staff.

The next disease plaguing our Pakistan Community was "housing", with most of our members living in precarious conditions in undesirable areas. So, in 1986, on the occasion of 1400th Birth Anniversary of our beloved lady, Bibi Zainab, we established Zainabia Trust (under my chairmanship) and ventured into housing scheme, with a promise to provide one family with an apartment every month so in the 1986 Zainabia Trust bought one apartment at Noorani Manzil and allocated it to one deserving family. However, perusal of applica-tions that we received from our community revealed that "housing shelters-less' 'was a daunting task, so we decided to make "housing" our full time occu-pation. Soon, we established an office of Zainabia Trust at Kharadhar with full time paid staff and accelerated our work. With systematic organization, dedicated staff, volunteers and members of the Managing Committee, Zainabia Trust has to its credit 22 multi-story buildings - all named after Bibi Zainab. Zainabia Trust also bought apartments from private developers to supplement its own developments. Whilst many people played commendable part under the aegis of Zainabia Trust, I cannot mention the names of all but let it suffice to mention a few

notable mem-bers of the Managing Committee like

Hussein M. Alibhai (Vice Chairman), Altaf Hussein

Kikiriya (Hon. Secretary), Late Amir Ali Patel (Hon.

Treasurer), Gulam Abbas Badami, late Asgher Gilani, and late Hussain I. Haji (Sheny).

A housing project is capital intensive and without our donors, we could not have succeeded. So may Allah SWT bestow His choicest blessings on our donors - prominent among them are Agha family, Gokal family, Late Roshan Hiridjee of Madagascar, Late Roshan Merali Chuzi of Mombasa, Naushad Merali of Nairobi, Late Fidahussein Rawji, Family of Mohamed Taki Rawji, etc. etc.

Having taken care of social and religious requirements of the community, it was time to do something for economic upliftment of the business community, so with my ever-supporting friends, that is late Sheny Ibrahim Haji and Hus-sein M. Alibhai, we launched a commercial Chamber of Commerce in London in October 1991 under the name of Jaffery International Business Association (since abbreviated to Jiba International) with worldwide network. Again, I led Jiba International as its Chairman for a number of years.



I was also privileged to serve as President of Federation of Khoja Shia Isnaasheri Jamaats of Pakistan for three years up to 19th July, 2020. During my Presidency, I was able to convince the World Federation of KSIMC (WF) to convene its Executive Council meeting at Karachi during November, 2018. At this meeting, WF decorated prominent members of Karachi Jamaat, including but not limited to Alhaj Mustafa Gokal, Alhaj Rafique M. Habib, Alhaj Jameel Yusuf S. St., Ms. Nadira Panjwani and Alhaj Dilawer Agha. A handsome amount of Pak Rs 10 million was also presented to Hon Syed Ali Haider Zaidi, Federal Minister for Maritime Affairs, as a donation to the Federal Government of Pakistan for construction of Diamer-Bhasha and Mohmand dams.

July 2020 marked 60 years of my CONTINUOUS service to Khoja Shia institu-tions, so I decided that, from 19th July, 2020, when an election of new Office Bearers of Federation of KSIJ of Pakistan will take place, I will seek leave from all my Khoja brothers and sisters and retire from all Khoja institutions that I have served and am serving.

For my services, I have been bestowed with awards and recognition by many institutions, amongst which are the following:

- World Federation of KSIMC
- Federation of K.S.I. Jamaats of Africa
- K.S.I. Jamaat of Dar es Salam
- K.S.I. Jamaat of Karachi
- Council of Gujarat -India.
- Mehfil-e-Murtaza
- Al Murtaza School
- Zainabia Trust
- -JIBA
- -TNBC
- -TPSF

However, having desired to retire, I beg forgiveness from one and all whom I may not have been able to serve or whom I have in any way offended. I also pray that may Allah SWT accept my services of 60 years, Ameen

As said above, I am retiring from all KHOJA institutions and I will miss meet-ings of World Federation and Africa Federation, which I fondly attended, whenever possible, as I will no longer attend any of these meetings.

However, before coming to the decision to retire, I had agreed to act as Chairman of Khoja Shia Ithna Asheri Charitable Eye Centre, at the request of my sister (popularly known as Mama Keki) and her husband (Anver Merali) which was hoped to be established in the poor locality of Temeke, one of the suburbs of Dar es Salaam to serve the local population. This Centre is a forerunner of Bilal Eye Camps which have been regularly organized by Mama Keki and Anver Merali (together with their team of volunteers) since 1986, having to its credit not less than 12,000 eye surgeries and countless free spectacles. With the support of World Federation, Federation of Khoja Shia Ithnasheri Jamaats of Africa, Khoja Shia Ithnasheri Jamaat of Dar Es Salaam, Central Health Board of Daressalaam Jamaat, and our various philanthropists, volunteers together with my Managing Committee, have succeeded to establish a Khoja Shia Ithna Asheri Charitable Eye Centre (under sponsorship of KSI Jamaat of Dar Es Salaam) for free treatment of poor patients. Alhamdullah, this project has come to fruition with its opening on 20th June, 2021 by Temeke District Medical Officer jointly with Alhaj Safder Jaffer, President of World Federation.

The building housing this Centre has been placed at our disposal by Khoja Shia Isnaasheri Jamaat of Dar es Salaam and Bilal Muslim Mission, for which I am thankful.

We have also received a donation of \$95,000 for equipping a modern Operat-ing Theatre from Mohsin & Fauzia Jaffer Foundation of USA through World Federation. Jazakallah.

Since opening of our Centre in June 2021 till end of November 2021, the Centre has screened more than 2954 patients and has operated upon 174 patients. The Centre employs full time one ophthalmologist, two optometrists, administrator, nurses, etc under the able leadership of Dr Shiraz Datoo, who is the Chief Executive Officer. The contribution of Dr Shiraz Datoo is exem-plary from conception of the project till now.

Due to excellent service being provided by the Centre without discrimination, the Centre has seen steady flow of patients increasing on daily basis to the extent that the Reception area is no longer able to accommodate the increas-ing number of patients. However, KSI Jamaat of Dar Es Salaam has kindly come to our rescue by giving us on 30th November, 2021 free of charge one more building in the same compound for expansion.

However, this building needs extensive renovations and equipment, and hence our reliance on our donors please.



The rewards of this selfless program was the conversion to Shia Madhab of FOUR individuals who took part in the program.

Khoja Shia Ithanasheri Jamaat of Dar es Salaam organizes a 3-day camp titled: Mafunzo Ya Imam Hussain (a.s.) [The teachings of In Surah Al Munafiqun, chapter 63 of the Quran, verse number 10 tells, "And donate from what We have provided for you before death comes to one of you, and you cry, "My Lord! If only You delayed me for a short while, I would give in charity and be one of the righteous."

The first of its kind on multiple levels, a program that encapsulated the true essence of the sacrifice of Imam Hussain (a.s.) and his family. KSI Jamaat of Dar es Salaam showcased to the residents of Dar es Salaam who the Shias are, what humanitarian work they already do and how it was taught by Prophet Muhammad(s) and Imam Hussain (as), as well as serving the community in terms of health through a free eye camp, health camp and mental awareness for 3 days.

A unique event in that the KSIJDar called together and united to work with more than 50 different Shia institutions, NGO's and medical facilities across the City of Dar es Salaam.

There were 7,200 visitors mainly from Dar es Salaam as well as surrounding regions and all faith backgrounds who heard the call of the camp of Hussain and wanted to partake in its free services. The camp had more than 40 sheikhs, 30 doctors and professionals to cater to the wide public for their various needs.

The Tabligh team comprised of Bilal, Al Itrah, Kigogo Mosque, Wipahs and headed by Dr Kazim Dhalla of KSIJ Dar were responsible for spreading the good message of the Holy Quran to those who wanted to learn more, as well to teach about the good practices of the Holy Prophet, Prophet Muhammed(s) and his grandson, Imam Hussain. 800 people reached out for more information on Shia Madhab AFTER THE PROGRAM of which 4 have been known to have converted and become practicing Shia Ithna Asheri.

The eye specialists, nurses, and volunteers managed to screen 4103 patients, dispense 1789 eye drop medicines to the patients and give out 1699 reading glasses for free to the elderly. In the 3 days alone, the eye camp saw 338 cases of cataract - these patients have been referred to their eye hospitals in Temeke and Kibaha; KSI Charitable Eye Centre and Medewell. The patients who were found to have cataract cases will now undergo surgery to treat their eyes for free. This process has already started and patients were reported to have reached the hospitals on Monday and Tuesday.

The doctors, nurses and volunteers screened 2571 patients for pressure, sugar and non- transmittable diseases. They found 187 cases where follow up was required and these patients have been referred to Ebrahim Haji Charitable Health Centre for more follow up.

In the department of Mental health,— the Khoja shia gave education to more than 4,000 people who visited the camp 'Mafunzo Ya Imam Hussain'. This being an area where the illness is often not talked about. Fikra Afya and The Awaited Rehab championed the education given.

Finally in their blood donation camp, they collaborated with Damu Salama and WhoisHussain.org; the Khoja shia managed to collect 1443 units of blood. Which will now be used to help those requiring blood. Working towards the recently awarded world record of having collected the most pints of blood in a single day by any organization in the world.

The question arises as to why the Khoja Shia Ithna Asheri community of Dar es Salaam embarked on a project of such a large scale and to offer their services, time and effort for free. If one was to visit the camp, they would leave with their answer – it was due to the teachings that the Shia have learnt from the final prophet, Prophet Muhammed (s) and his holy household (AhlulBayt). Learning about the religion which teaches us to be kind to all, to respect everyone and to benefit your community is an easy principle to listen to but difficult to implement.

But, the Khoja Shia Community showed through their collaboration efforts that between all their institutions they were already offering services to our country and its people. Be it via means of digging wells, providing for the orphan children, special needs schools, holding walks or marathons to raise awareness, feeding and clothing the hungry and poor or offering their services like they did in the 3 day camp at Mnazi Moja.

The KSI community have put in practice the lessons they have learned from the Prophet and Imams and have shown how the religion of Islam is being practiced already and how to implement the teachings of these holy personalities.

The new team under the able leadership of Al Haj Asger Bhai Dhanji has produced commendable results to raise the quality of healthcare and all related services at the Ebrahim Haji Charitable Health Centre (EHCHC).

**Head of Central Medical Board** – Asger Bhai Dhanji, Vice – Dr Mahmood Bhai Hameer, Secretary – Shabbirali Bhai Mussa and Treasurer Aliabbas Bhai Manii.

The CMB delivered on its objective of uplifting the infrastructure of Ebrahim Haji Charitable Health Centre for health and safety and continue to build the image of the institution. The key areas of focus were increasing the number of consultation rooms for specialists, restructuring the old theater to meet higher standards and setting up a training center for its staff members.

Among the achievements that the health facility saw during the revamping phase were as follows: 3 new and spacious consultation rooms to cater for an increasing number of specialists and patients

New conference room / training center for staff activities and meetings

2 private rooms with television, fridge and microwave facilities and 1 deluxe room with an additional sofa bed

Significant upgrade to the old theater to support improved quality and number of surgeries especially in the maternity department

A canteen for staff, patients and their relatives which will open soon

Separate entrance for emergency cases directly connected to the casualty and critical care ward.

# JAFFERY HOSPITAL - OLD TOWN

2019 unlocked another project to mark; The Jaffery Hospital –A vision to have a revolutionary medical infirmary.

The ground-breaking ceremony was held on 20th March 2019 -13th Rajab 1440 AH of the Jaffery Hospital at the Old Hydery Mosque by elders of the community and Alhaj Shabbir Najafi, President of AFED.

The construction and modification work commenced immediately.



The hospital includes numerous medical facilities such as out-patient, X-Ray, MRI, CT Scan, Pharmacy, laboratories and other diagnostic facilities. These facilities will be supported at the former Lamuwalla building.

The main hospital will consist of two operation theaters which will perform major and minor surgeries.

An intensive care unit (ICU) with a capacity to hold 6 Beds, children ward and a separate section to care for 80 Ward Beds is amongst the facilities at the hospital.

We are grateful for the Donation of US Dollar 1 Million towards this project from Jaffer Foundation, Mombasa of USD 500,000 and Dr. Mohsin and Fauzia Jaffer Foundation of USD 500,000 respectively to enhance speedy constructions of the hospital building.





While the construction of the structure is fully funded, an appeal for donations towards furniture, medical equipment, ICU equipment and Operation theater equipment is requested.



# KAMPALA JAMAAT



Kampala Jamaat, having a hundred year old history and a foundation that the fathers and forefathers have gradually been building on over the decades decided to take off in the past couple of years and worked towards major improvements in each aspect of community life.

With the Vision and Agenda of the Executive Committee and Board of Trustees, one of Kampala Jamaat's major focus was on being financially stronger. To achieve this the Jamaat decided to work on improving all its century old properties. Major Renovations were done on Plot 18 Ben Kiwanuka leading to double the income and a more modern look to the Building. Plot 6 Wilson Road named "the mall" a hundred year old property of the Jamaats was demolished and built into an eight storey commercial project for Kampala Jamaat, this project is currently the highest community income generating project in Africa. With much much more income the Jamaat targets to first work on other projects and uplift the Jamaat further, alongside it also plans to help the communities around Africa through African Federation as it always has done.

The Jamaat also worked on the youngsters of the community. This is one of the few Jamaat where almost every single youth is actively involved in the progress of the community one way or another. The Jamaat also upgraded its multi purpose sports facilities to AstroTurf for the youngsters to socialize and remain within the Jamaat Complex rather than going out.

The Jamaat has started putting serious efforts into the school. Upto 2022 it was a primary school with the highest level of education which led to the students being covered by local newspapers for being toppers in the whole country. Now in phases the school has started its secondary level and plans to have a complete secondary block in the near future. Kampala Jamaat for decades had a fantastic sponsorship scheme for its students in schools.

The Jamaat had invited Maulana Ali Abbas Rizvi to be the Resident Alim and help take the community forward in every aspect. The Madressah curriculum was updated and continued to prosper to higher levels, while strict discipline and Ikhlaaq are amongst main focus for the children and youth.

From 2022 to date twelve Guest Alims were invited to recite along with six Guest Nohakhwaans/Qasida Khwaans all of whom along with the Jamaats Resident Alim brought different ideologies and philosophies from the pulpit keeping the population on track with high emotions during Azadari, Immense love for Allah (s.w.t.) and our 14 Masumeen and strictly following the Wajibat of Shia Islam. Amongst the honor of hosting all the Alims and Reciters Kampala also hosted a Mujtahid, Allama Syed Muntazir Mehdi Sab who gave remarkable lectures and had close Question and Answer sessions with the community. Alhamdulillah Kampala Jamaat has a community that all follow tagleed and have zero problems on Ageedah and Imaan that other Shia Communities are facing around the globe.

0.6% of the Jamaats population is on Welfare, however mostly the members of Kampala Jamaat and other well wishers help out those in need, keeping the welfare on the Jamaat close to zero throughout the years. Fantastic Medical Insurance schemes are also arranged where the majority of the community partake in the scheme and have benefited greatly over the past few years.



For the first time, Kampala Jamaat made a documentary "Panjo Uganda" on its history and the difficulties of the Exodus. The documentary was directed and sponsored by resident members and achieved worldwide appreciation for its matter and professionalism. The documentary is on Kampala Jamaats and Africa Federation Youtube Channels.



The social welfare of the Jamaat is an example for communities to learn from. With a population exceeding 500 people the community has several sports nights, family fun nights and activities throughout the year to keep the members close together like one big family. The Jamaat also has over 160 privately donated full fledged Niyaz annually with the highest quality food at extremely low costs. The Ladies also arrange several events throughout the year, from Economic Upliftment workshops to Senior Citizen get-togethers.

Still far from perfection and working towards betterment everyday, yet anyone that stays and becomes a part of Kampala Jamaat will try his level best never to leave Kampala.
