

KIGOMA GETS NEW IMAMBARA

The Chairman of the Federation, Alhaji Mohamed Dhirani officially inaugarated a new Imambara in Kigoma last May. The tape cutting at this memorable occasion was done by Mowlana Seyed Sajjad Hussein of Dar es Salaam Jamaat at the request of Alhaj Dhirani.

The Chairman who was on an official visit to Kigoma was accompanied on the trip by Vice Chairman Haji Habib J. Mulji and Mowlana Sayed Sajjad Hussein of Dar es Salam Jamaat. Two veteran Kigoma Businessmen who have been residing in Dar es Salaam, Haji Mubarak Ladhu Jaffer and Haji Amirali Mulla were also in the Chairman's delegation.

The delegation was received in Kigoma by the Acting President of the Jamaat, Haji Muslim Fazal Kassam and members of the Managing Committee there.

In a speech during the Imambara opening ceremony, Mr. Mohamed Dhirani thanked Almighty Allah for his mercy and countless blessings on all Mominins and also for having given his delegation an opportunity to visit Kigoma on the auspicious occasion. He said he was pleased and highly impressed on the way affairs of the Kigoma Jamaat were being managed. He said that it was an open fact that Imambaras existing in any corner of the world today, from where the light of true Islam beams, are the result of that unique and unparalleled sacrifice made by Imam Hussein (A.S.) in Kerbala.

IMAMBARA SIGNIFICANCE:

The Chairman went on to say that Imambaras had always been of significance in moulding our lives and habits towards true Islamic ethics. He said the Imambaras had proved to be effective in propagating Islamic knowledge to community members in a manner no other institution could have imparted. He added that congregating at Imambaras had become a recognised precept of our lives to an extent that as soon as the number of community members grew in any part of the world-east or west — there would be a growing awareness on the need of Imambaras.

Dhirani then congratulated the youths for the splendid manner in which they had decorated and illuminated the Imambara and Mosque complex — to mark the historical event of the century in Kigoma.

Finally the Chairman reminded his audience that the Secretariat had established the This page is donated by:





Burundi Impresses Visiting Entourage

After performing the opening ceremony of the Kigoma Imambara the Federation Chairman Alhaj Mohamed Dhirani visited Bujumbura and was accompanied by the Vice Chairman Alhaj Habib Mulji on this tour. The two were warmly received by the President of Bujumbura Jamaat Mr. Ahmed Noormohamed Hirji along with Haji Abdulhussein Habib, Mowlana Sayed Sakhi Ahmed and the Treasurer of the Jamaat Mr. Mustafa A. Chagani. On the same day, Alhaj Alibhai Mohamed Jaffer of Mombasa and Ramazan Mulla Nanji of Nairobi flew in from Kenya to join the Chairman's delegation.

The delegation first paid a visit to the Bilal Muslim Mission Centres at Kinama, Cibitoni and Buyenzi and were impressed to see the remarkable progress being made by the converts at these centres.

Kinama which was established in 1977 has a population of 300 Shias with a fully equipped Primary School and two Mosques, one of them Ijuma Mosque.

Cibitoni has a Mosque and Madressa in one building and all the 62 students are Shias.

Buyenzi is running two Madressas with 85 and 62 Shia' students respectively.

The students demonstrated their talents by reciting Tilawate Quran, giving lectures on the life of Prophet Muhammed (S.A.W.) and on the life of the Masumeen and of Imam Hussein (A.S.). They also lectured on Islamic obligations and interpreted different suras in Arabic with Kiswahili translations. Three students also demonstrated Namaze Juma.

Alhaj Alibhai Mohamed Jaffer addressed the students, teachers and converts at each centre and said that Islam was a universal religion and did not belong to any particular communty or race. He said Bilal was an African who sacrificed and suffered for Islam whilst he was in the company of our Prophet. Alibhai also said that it was chronical that whilst Arabs were fighting against Imam Hussein (A.S.), Africans had fought and sacrificed their lives in Kerballa to save Islam and human dignity.

PURPOSE OF LIFE:

Murabbi Alibhai explained the purpose of Life in Islam, the importance of TAKWA and the qualifications required to be a MUTTAKI. He narrated the sacrifice made by AHLUL BAIT and quoted some of the traditions of Imam Hassan (A.S.), our second Imam who taught us to guard ourselves from three evils i.e. TAKABBUR (pride), HIRSE (Temptation) and HASAD (Jealousy) to become a true Muslim.

Addressing the children, Haji Alibhai emphasised that Prophet Muhammed (S.A.W.) used to love children because of two qualities namely that children play with sand wherein lies the final destination of all humans and secondly because the hearts of infants are free from malice and jealousy.

In his address, the Chairman of the Federation, Alhaj Mohamed Dhirani said that he had been highly impressed with the high standard of teaching in all the Madressas. He called for brilliant students to be sent to Nairobi and Iran for further studies so that Burundi could become self sufficient in its teaching force.

Dhirani said he had taken a note of the Mission's needs and problems and would try to assist wherever it was possible to do so.

The Chairman then praised Haji Abdulhusseir. Habib for his great sacrifice of time and money to bring the Bilal Mission to its present stage. "You have worked single handed and it is only ALLAH who can assess your reward of propagating the true faith" the Chairman commented.

The delegation later made a familiarisation tour of Gitega where they met five families of our community residing there. They had lunch with Haji Fidahusseinbhai.

A dinner was also organised at the Imambara in honour of the Chairman and his delegation. At this dinner the President of the Jamaat Mr. Ahmed N. Hirjee thanked the Chairman and his delegation for making a visit to Bujumbura inspite of the small Jamaat there and said that the visit had proved further, the devotion and dedication of the Federation Office Bearers.

The Chairman, Mohamed Dhirani in reply said he was thankful to ALLAH for granting this opportunity to be in Burundi. He spoke on the establishment of the Federation, its purpose, aims and achievements.

NEED FOR A MOSQUE:

Dhirani added that he was very happy to see that all activities of the Jamaat including the Madressa, were managed in a commendable manner. He recognised the need for a Mosque in the community and advised the management to look into the possibility of constructing a Mosque to mark the 1400th Birthday of our beloved Imam Hussein (A.S.).

He also conveyed greetings on the occasion of the 14th centenary of the Birth of Imam Hussein (A.S.) and congratulated Bujumbura Jamaat for having organised various programmes to celebrate this happy and historical event.

Alhaj Alibhai Mohamed Jaffer spoke on the activities of the Bilal Muslim Mission in Kenya and Tanzania and praised Bujumbura for their excellent performance in Tabligh Activities.

The delegation was hosted by Haji Abdulhussein Habib who provided excellent hospitality during the five days they stayed with him.



ALIBHAI AWARDED HAIDERY MEDAL

The Chairman of the Federation, Alhaj Mohamed Dhirani awarded the "Haidery Medal" to Alha, Alibhai Mohamedjaffer Sheriff Dewji for his outstanding contribution towards the cause of Islam and for his distinguished services to the community. The presentation of this award was made by Mowlana Sayed Aqa Haider of Mombasa.

Haji Alibhai was born in Zanzibar in 1912 and after completing Primary School studies on the Island, he joined the Alidina Visram High School at Mombasa where he pursued secondary ducation.

Alibhai began his honorary service work at the Union and club levels in Mombasa and became Chairman of the Jaffery Sports Club in 1943 and of the Ithnaasheri Young Men's Union in 1945. He-then became Chairman of the Shia Ithnaasheri BOSTANI JAMAAT and was elected Vice Chairman of the Federation of the Khoja Shia Ithnaasheri Jamaats of Africa in 1971.

Haji Saheb did not restrict his services to the Community. He was the Hon. Secretary of the Mombasa Muslim Association and also served as a member of the Asian Educational Advisory Council during the colonial rule.

Alibhai was a force behind the establishment of the Bilal Muslim Mission and worked tirelessly with Mowlana Sayyed Saeed Akhtar Rizvi during its initial stage. To this day he devotes his full time, with no remuneration, to provide dedicated services to the Bilal Mission.

Murrabbi Alibhai has also remained an eminent Zakir for the past three decades and his oratorial brilliance has always impressed his audience. His contribution towards publication include the "Selection from Quran" which he wrote jointly with the Late Mulla Hussein A. Rahim and "UONGOZI WA TABIA NJEMA" which was again a joint contribution with Dr. Abdulkader of Bilal Muslim Mission of Kenya. Alibhai performed his first Haj at the age of 8 years, having travelled by ship and then by a caravan driven by Camels. He is a widely travelled men having visited Iraq, Iran, Syria, Somalia, Ethiopia, India and Pakistan.

Haji Saheb can speak eight languages fluently, namely English, Gujarati, Kiswahili, Urdu, Farsi, Arabic, Punjabi and Cutchi.

May Allah grant Haji Alibhai a long and healthy life.

CYCLONE DEVASTATES MADAGASCAR TOWN

A cyclone hit Majunga in Madagascar in April this year and scores of buildings were badly damaged. Hundreds of people were made homeless and about 30% of our community members suffered a considerable loss

A delegation of the Madagascar Territorial Council, led by its Vice President Alhaj Raza Ali Hiridjee, flew from Tananarive to Majunga to make an 'on the spet' investigation and to assess the damage done. A relief fund was immediately launched and generous contributions started pouring into the Council's Office from the Moameens of Madagascar Jamaats.

After completing this assignment, Alhaj Raza Ali, accompanied by the Secretary of the Territorial Council, Mr. Asgher Djaffer and the Immediate Past President of the Territorial Council, Mr. Houssenaly Hiridjee flew to Mombasa to attend the meeting of the Khoja Shia Ithnaasheri Supreme Council and gave a comprehensive report of the devastation caused by the cyclone. The Council Session took a note of the event with great sorrow and expressed sympathy to all those who were affected.

The Secretariat sent a telegram of sympathy to the Majunga Jamaat and the Chairman of the

Federation, Mr. Dhirani, requested Alhaj Manzoorali Kanani, Chairman of the Nairobi Jamaat to visit Majunga on his behalf.

Manzoorali Kanani flew first to Tananarive and then to Majunga. From Tananarive, he was joined by the Vice President and Secretary of the Territorial Council, Raza Ali Hiridjee and Asgher Djaffer and also by Mr. Gulamabbas Habib Sunderjee and Mr. Raza Ali Mohamedali Djafffer.

MILLION FRANCS DONATED:

Manzoorali visited the affected places, met the families who were victims of the cyclone and discussed the situation with the Managing Committee of the Jamaat. An Extra-ordinary General Meeting was called following Manzoorali Kanani's visit during which a message from the Chairman of the Federation, Alhai Mohamed Dhirani was read conveying the Federation's deep sympathy.

Kanani also announced a donation of Francs One Million on behalf of the Federation.

During this meeting the Vice President and Secretary of the Territorial Council

also assured the Majunga Jamaat of the Council's full support. In response, the Majunga Jamaat's Secretary said he was deeply moved and encouraged by the material and moral support of the Federation of Africa and the Territorial Council of Madagascar.





CONCISE REPORT OF COUNCIL SESSION

The 42nd Session of the Supreme Council held in Mombasa (Kenya) from 20 to 23 April, 1984 was a First in many respects.

It was the first meeting of the Council to be held in Kenya after more than a decade. The Session was being held in Mombasa after fifteen years!

For the first time, representatives from Kinshasa (Zaire) and Bujumbura (Burundi) attended the meeting and following last year's Council request, the Bilal Muslim Missions of Madagascar and Burundi submitted their Reports at the Session, for the first time.

The Session was well attended and truly represented. Councillors and Invitees from the following places took part:-

(3) Education Board:

Report of the newly established Education Board with its Headquarter at Moshi (Tanzania) was presented for discussion.

Draft by laws of the Higher Education Board were approved after lengthy discussions.

With the establishment of this Board, it was hoped that Educational matters would be well attended to thereby giving satisfactory services to the community.

(4) Tabligh Reports:

Apart from Reports from Jamaats, the Secretariat for the first time presented its Report on Tabligh.

A new Format for the Tabligh Report was introduced and many Jamaats submitted their reports in line with this format.

(5) Bilal Muslim Missions:

Reports of Bilal Muslim Missions of Burundi Kenya, Madagascar and Tanzania were presented.

Haji Abdulhussein Habib Khaki of Bilal Muslim Mission of Burundi presented a very interesting report of tabligh activities in Burundi and Zaire. The Mission in Burundi is also doing tabligh work in neighbouring Zaire. His speech created great interest and led to a visit to Burundi by representatives of Bilal Muslim Mission of Kenya.

(6) The World Federation:

For the first time a report of the World Federation was circulated to all the Councillors.

The President of the World Federation, Haji Haider Haji, graced the occasion with his presence and gave a long speech explaining the activities of the World Federation. It aroused great interest.

Haji Mohamedjaffer Kassmali Gulamhussein of Karachi presented Reports of Bilal Trust of Pakistan, Islamic Seminary and Darul Hikmah — all of Karachi — both in writing and orally.

(7) Madagascar Territorial Council:

Following a request at the last Conference, the Vice President and Hon. Secretary of Madagascar Territorial Council, Haji Razaali Hirjee and Asgherali Jaffer attended the session and submitted a detailed report of their activities. They were accompanied to the Session by Murabbi Husseinali Hirjee, ex-President of the, Territorial Council.

The Madagascar delegation was delayed because of a visit they had to make to Majunga where a Cyclone devastated many houses thereby affecting about thirty percent of our community there. The delegation gave a concise report of the damage sustained by our community at Majunga and on efforts being made to assist them.

"(8) Federation Samachar Report:

The Editors of "Federation Samachar" submitted a written report outlining some of the problems being encountered in taking out regular issues of the magazine.

Councillors made some useful suggestions on improving the image of the Samachar.

(9) Audited Accounts and Budget;

Audited Accounts for January to September 1983 were presented and approved.

Budget for 1983/1984 and 1984/1985 were circulated and approved by the Council. For the first time Income and Expenditure for Kenya and Tanzania were presented separately.

(10) Resolutions:

The following resolutions were approved by the Council:-

- (a) It was agreed that all applications for Marriage Assistance be considered on merits and awarded accordingly.
 - (b) Hadiya of Molvis was revised and a full report appears elsewhere in this issue.
- (c) It was resolved that the Council should set aside adequate funds to enable its of ficials to take care of travelling and other incidental expenses, if required.
- (11) Reports of Madrasalul Rasulul Akram (S.A.W.) and Haji Assistance Committee were circulated in writing and members were given opportunity to express their views.

FAITH AND ACTION

Faith without action is a dead letter. Islam teaches us that faith by itself is not enough until it is transformed into action. The Prophet Muhammad (peace be upon him) said: "Faith does not depend on raising hopes, but it is something which is firmly established in the heart and testified to by action. Verily there are people who have been deceived by their hopes, so that they finally leave this world without merit. They used to say, "We have good expectations from Allah." Yet they only deceived themselves. For, had they truly placed good expectations in Allah, they would have excelled in good deeds."

Each Muslim is taught that he is personally responsible for his own action, both in this world and in the next. Islam teaches that every individual must carry the responsibility of his own actions, and that no one can carry that burden for him.

POINT TO PONDER

PORK IN GELATIN CHEESE

We thank Bwana Ali Sheriff of Arusha for making this article available to us. The article was first published in the March, 1984 issue of the Hong Kong Muslim Herald.

Gelatin, which is liberally used for preparing various delicacies and as a stabiliser in ice creams, jellies, couffle, jams and cheese contains pork fat, according to findings recently released.

The President of the Consumers Association of Penang, Malaysia, brother S.M. Muhammad Idres, in an open letter, has cautioned the Muslim World that pork is liberally used in the production of Gelatin.

Brother Idris says: "It has come as a shock to us that many Muslim consumers have been unwittingly consuming gelatin that is derived from pork. Our investigation has brought forth ample evidence to show beyond doubt that unwanted pork parts are predominantly used in the manufacture of gelatin. This is marketed and sold to consumers including Muslims throughout the world without warning or informing the consumer of the type of animal from which it is derived.

"We have also been officially notified by the Islamic Research Centre of the Malaysian Government (under the Prime Minister's Department) that Gelatin has been confirmed to be predominantly made out of pork. According to them, this is more so now since it has been found that "the manufacturing process for gelatin from pork (swine) skin is faster and the resultant Gelatin is of higher quality".

"We have also been informed by the Islamic Research Centre that while a great deal of Gelatin is made from pork, because of the non-halal method of slaughter, no matter what animal is used the Gelatin will still be haram. This includes Gelating produced from cow or goat not slaughtered in the Islamic way"

As for CHEESE, THE British magazine 'Home Economics' of March, 1982, describing the manufacturing process says: "Cheshire and Lancashire cheeses are removed from the moulds after two days, then dried, bandaged with fresh cheese-cloth and finaly waxed with hot lard (pig fat). Cheddar cheese in cylindrical moulds is removed after 24 hours, bathed in very hot water to melt the outside and form a seal, greased with hot lard and then returned to the moulds and pressed for a further 24 hours. It is only at this stage that the cheese in rectangular blocks (destined daily for the large national supermarket chains) differs from the cheese made in cylindrical mould. (AL-ISLAM).

WHAT FOR DID IMAM HUSAIN SEEK HELP?

On the plains of Kerbala on the Day of Ashura, the Imam was also repeatedly heard calling for help in these words:

"Is there any helper to come and help us? Is there any one to come to our aid?" The philosophers on the martyrdom of Kerbala tell us that it was meant to sound a final warning to the followers of Yazid to reappraise their position and consider abandoning the path of falsehood of Yazid and switch over to the path of righteousness, so as to redeem themselves from the hell-fire on the Day of Judgement.

Besides the seeking of aid by the Imam was a worldwide message and call for help to all present and future people to preserve the sanctity of Islam and its tenets against whatever odd that may be. The call for help by the Imam was for the preservation of Islam in its prestine purity, free of any adulteration and alteration.

What did these words imply and what sort of help

NASSER IS NOW MOMBASA TOWN CLERK

Mr. Abbas Husein Mohamedali Nasser was born in Zanzibar on 22nd August, 1938. He then accompanied his father to Mombasa in 1944 when the latter, who was then employed by Cable & Wireless Limited, Zanzibar, was transferred to Mombasa.

Nasser had his primary education at the Ithna-Asheri Primary School up to Std. IV. Thereafter he joined the Government Kikowani Primary School to complete his primary education. He had his secondary education at Technical High School, Mombasa, where he passed the London Chamber of Commerce School Certificate of Commercial Education Examination. He also passed the Cambridge School Certificate and the G.C.E. of the Associated Examining Board by private studies.

Mr. Nasser studied in his spare-time for the examinations of the Institute of Chartered Secretaries and Administrators.. He was elected a Fellow of the Institute on 15th November, 1983. He is also a Fellow of the British Institute of Management, having been elected to the Fellowship on 11th October, 1983.

Mr Nasser's first employment, was with the E.A. Customs & Excise Department. Later he joined the Alibhai Panju Primary School as a School Clerk. He was then appointed Junior Administrative Assistant with the Municipal Council on 1st November, 1962 under the Council's Localisation and Training Programme.

In July, 1958 Mr. Nasser was promoted to the post of Assistant Town Clerk and became the Town's Deputy Town Clerk on 26th March, 1976. He earned a further promotion in November, 1983 when he was appointed the Town Clerk and Chief Executive of the Municipal

Born in October, 1957 and a civil engineer by profession, Mohamed also represents the Jaffery Club in football and volleyball.


A prolific upper-order batsman and a fine fielder who at times even guards the wickets. Mohamed has been playing regularly for the club's first team since 1974.



TRUTH ABOUT OUR STUDENTS ABROAD

This article written by Geraldine Paget was first published in the 1961 issue of the Federation Samachar. The gist of the article still applies today and we are therefore republishing this (with minimal changes in language) in the interest of our esteemed readers

OCCASIONALLY alarming reports filter through to East Africa about the behaviour of our students abroad; reports of wild parties, gambling, secret marriages, un payable debts, and the like Are they true?

In have lived among these students for five years, and I know that they are. Some students go to England and return home covered in glory. Many set out with earnest intentions and fail on the way. Others start out with the avowed intention of "lilving it up" and their stories would fill their parents with horror and shame.

I know of parents who are awaiting the return of their sons with high expectations of good qualifications they have invested thousands of pounds towards obtaining the right education for their children. The dilemma however is just how many will live up to those expectations!

FAILURE

In many cases I know the boys too, and my knowledge would break their parents' hearts. I can't even meet the eyes of the proud mothers, when they talk of the return of the family genius, and I can't bring myself to tell them the truth, either.

It is very easy to see how a boy can lose the right track. He fails one examination, and keeps up the pretence to his parents that he has passed. At his second attempt he fails again, and is even more reluctant to admit his failure.

After a couple of years he is hopelessly out of his depth, and feeling that he now has nothing to lose, he devotes himself to good time. A 'good time' to a student is a hectic life, and an endless round of parties, love affairs, cards and drink. Friday-to-Monday parties, are by no means uncommon in London. I attended one such party where the gin was "100 per cent proof, guaranteed home made." I don't know if that description was entirely accurate, but it certainly tasted like no gin I have encountered before or since.

Gambling is rife. I have seen students mortgage their entire month's allowance in the cause of poker, or the same amount on a single game of snooker. None of the boys can afford to gamble on this scale, but none of them wants to lose face.

LIVING IN SIN

"Living in sin" is common state of affairs in London, too common to cause any comment. Decency seems to be left behind when a student leaves home, and "respectability" is an old-fashioned word, to be laughed at the way one laughs at a maiden aunt. The general notion seems to be that you cannot be virtuous and enjoy life.

Some boys throw their standards completely overboard: others merely shelve them to keep the respect of their companions. I asked one such boy, who was a shy seventeen-year-old, fresh from school, when I first knew him, why he had changed so radically after a year in London.

He was in wild company, had a permanent hangover, and had allowed his books to gather dust. Ultimately he sold them to pay his rent. He was rather sheepish, and said: "Oh you know, one has to go along with the crowd." And what a crowd!

Many students marry abroad, and most of them tell their parents. Most of the marriages are with decent girls, and the couples manage to make a happy life for themselves. Other boys, generally the younger ones, get entangled with girls who dream of catching Maharajahs, and their lives, happy enough in London, become a nightmare of disillusion in East Africa.

CHILDREN BEYOND COUNT

I have known students to miss their mothers and marry their landladies. Many have married to give a child a name, although plenty of boys dodge the responsibility. It is considered the height of sophistication for a boy to joke that he doesn't know how many children he has.

It seems that the boys are old enough to incur responsibilities, but not adult enough to shoulder them.

Students who go to Europe for further studies are inclined to lose their heads when they have their first taste of freedom from family ties. The only solution seems to be to give a boy adequate freedom as soon as he is old enough, and to teach him how to use it.

When he goes abroad, he should go on the strict understanding that he will be supported by his family for three years, or five, or however long his chosen course is expected to take.

He should know that his parents intend to write to his Principal for regular reports on his progress, and he should understand that if he fails an examination due to any fault of his own, that will be the end of his financial backing from home.

This sounds harsh for a beloved son, but similar parental firmness would have saved many headstrong boys from ruin and shame.

If you contemplate sending your son abroad to study, for his own good make sure that he is fit to be let loose alone. Don't kid yourself that the standards you have imposed on him are binding. Unless he has an adequate sense of responsibility, they won't be. The mockery of his companions will hold far more terrors for him than distant parental wrath.

The majority of students live on bread and fresh air for the latter part of each month. It is troublesome, but well worth while to send a boy his allowance weekly, or at most fortnightly. If possible, his parents should make sure that he is accommodated in a hostel, or with a family.

It is a good idea to make payments for board and lodging direct to the landlady who is caring for the boy or to the Director of his hostel. That way a parent can be certain that his son cannot get into debt for necessities, or go without them.

After all, why should a boy spend his allowance on rent and food, when it is so much more fun to spend it on drink and girl friends?

Every parent should keep an adequate check on his son's progress. The principals of colleges are always glad to help in this respect, and the knowledge that an adverse report may cause his allowance to be stopped will help to keep a boy at his books.

DANGER IN HAVING WRONG FRIENDS.

Don't delude yourself in thinking that after a boy has survived a few months on his own, the danger of his straying is past. By that time he will have found his feet and joined a clique, and in his choice of friends lies the real danger.

Of course, no one objects to students enjoying life. Student days are halcyon days and responsibilities settle all too quickly on young shoulders.

To an interested observer, however, who has made a study of the species, students seem to revel in a form of pleasure which amounts (dare I wound their adolescent hearts by saying it?) to vice. From one's earliest childhood the path of virtue seems a bore. Illicit pleasures, like smoking in the school lavatories, hold far more charm thanbeing a model child. But by the time a boy is old enough to enter a university he should have developed a sense of responsibility, and have the common sense to realise that he is sent abroad to fit himself for a useful life.

The truth is that a good 50 per cent of the boys who leave East Africa for the United Kingdom just aren't ready to leave the nursery.
