My Colleagues and I eventually decided that is publication must not be allowed to discontinue it could not be in Gujarati. We fully understood

the difference this would make in as much as that it would fail to cater for the needs of the Gujarati reading members of Somalia, Madagascar and certain parts of India and Pakistan. Yet, we have decided that in between these issues, efforts will made to bring out a special number or two in Gujarati, or in two languages — i.e. Gujarati and English.

Consequent upon this decision, I am glad to report that an Editorial Board has been set up in Dar es Salaam comprising of three members.


I wish them every success, and thank them earnestly for their co-operation.

The present chairman of the Federatio Mr. Asgharali M. M. Jaffer visited Zanzibar during December 1973, and was met by the Presidents of both the jamats to give initial touchings to the much longed for merger.

The Chairman advised them to pass a resolution at rather respective general meetings, giving assent to the principle of the said merger and total unification of the management and the trusts. We are pleased to report that such a resolution has been passed at the Management Committee level by each jamat, and a final assent to it by the general bodies of the said jamats is keenly awaited.

CIENCE AND MEDICINE

Since 1400 years ago Islam prohibits partaking of liquor for various reasons including social, health, economic effects. The western world at one time wither rediculed the rule of prohibition or preached against it. Article published in the TIMES of the oth February, 1974 speaks of ill-effects of liquor on liver —

IVERS AND LIQUOR

What causes alcoholics to develop cirrhosis and other frequently fatal liver diseases? Many doctors, noting the tendency of alcoholics to drink more than they eat, believe that poor nutrition plays key role. But two researchers from the Mount Sinai School of Medicine and the Bronx Veterans Hospital in New York now claim that it is drink alone that does the damage. A four-year study has convinced them that even in the well-nourished, alcohol can be lethal to the liver.

Drs. Emanuel Rubin and Charles Lieber selected paboons for their study because the primates live as long as 15 years, far longer than most other aboratory animals, and have livers that are similar to man's. The researchers put 26 baboons on high-protein, high-vitamin diets, but for 13 of the animals substituted ethanol, or grain alcohol, for much of the carbohydrate portion of the dietary requirements. The alcohol provided the animals with fully half their caloric intake.

The baboons responded to the booze—
equivalent to about a fifth per day for a man—
just as humans would. They became intoxicated
and, ultimately, dependent upon drink. Two of the
animals became so addicted to alcohol that they
experienced withdrawal symptoms, including what
seemed to be delirium tremens, or DTs, when off
the bottle.

But the most significant result of the study was the destruction of the myth that alcoholic liver damage is the result of a bad diet rather than booze. All of the animals who were kept on the drinker's diet for anywhere from nine months to four years developed some form of alcoholic liver damage. Seven of the baboons developed fatty livers, and four contracted alcoholic hepatitis. Two animals, kept on the bottle for four years, developed cirrhosis, the progressive and severe hardening and contraction of the liver.

The study provided other insights into alcoholism, which Rubin and Lieber consider to be one of man's worst "environmental" ailments. Because pure alcohol was used exclusively, it became evident that the toxic effects were the result of the alcohol itself and not, as some researchers have suggested, caused by any of the impurities or additives found in beer, wine or hard liquor. Concludes Rubin: "You can't protect yourself against alcoholic damage by eating well; what counts is the total amount of alcohol you drink."

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS

It has been brought to the attention of the Secretariat that in Tanzania and Kenya government public schools the management has faciliated Religious Education to various religions.

CAN LADIES AND GENTS SIT TOGETHER IN MAJLISES AND SOCIAL FUNCTIONS?

It is shocking to hear that these days some individuals in Canada and U.K. are inclined to arrange and hold majlises and other social functions where the ladies and gents sit in the same room or hall where there is no pardha at all.

It is amusing to learn that they are doing it in the name of avoiding 'discrimination'. Canada and U.K. and other European countries are Christian countries where neither the Catholics nor the Protestants admit women into Priesthood. Catholics nuns are obliged to cover their whole body even in their dormitories; and a woman going before the Pope must cover her whole body, even if she, in her public life, is a 'striptease artist.'

So, the 'anti-discrimination' laws have not compelled the Christians to relax their rules that are obviously based on "sex-discrimination."

Now coming to the Shia Ithna-Asheri Sheriat, it is the unanimous ruling of all the Mujtahids, right from the begining upto now that:

- A woman must cover her entire body and hair in such a way that it is not seen by any man who is not within prohibited degree. (Within prohibited degree with whom marriage is prohibited, like father, brother, son etc.).
- 2. It is 'Haram' (unlawful) for a man to look at the body (or part thereof) of a woman who is not MAHRAM whether it be with lusty intention or without such intention.
- 3. It is 'Haram' (unlawful) for a woman to look at the body of a man who is not MAHRAM,
- 4. The above rules are for her whole body except the face (excluding neck, ears and hair) and hands from the wrists to the finger-tips.

- 5. So far the face and hands (as explained above) are concerned, it is the unanimous ruling of al the Mujtahids that it is 'Haram' (unlawful) for a man to look at the face and hands of a woman (other than his wife) if that look is with intention, of lust, desire or enjoyment.
- 6. The only difference of opinion is about looking at the face and hands of a woman (who is no within prohibited degree) without any lusty intention. Some Mujtahids say that it is allowed; others say that it is not allowed.

Present great Mujtahids (Agha-e-Khou Agha-e-Shahrudi and Aga-e-Shariatmadari) say that it is not Haram to look at the face and hands (as explained earlier) of a woman who it not within prohibited degree, without any lusty intention. But even then, they say that it is 'Ihtiya-e-wajib' to refrain from such looking

 Looking at non-Muslim women, who do no cover their whole bodies, is allowed, if it is without any lusty intention.

Now if someone is prepared to reach the furthest limit, he can do so only IF the women folk cover their whole body from head to foo in a proper way (not in revealing clothes nor in inrevealing style). (To put it in a more clear way, a woman must cover herself as is done in Ihram, covering her neck, hair and ears also leaving only that part of the face open which is washed in Wudhu).

It is high time for women to be taught and made to attend majlises and other functions in proper Islamic dress, even if they sit behind partition. The Jews compel their congregation to wear scutch caps and prayer-shawls when praying in a synagogue, and it is not considered as an undue hardship. Why our own Jamats and individuals cannot make such rules?

We know that most of these women do not bserve purdah at all. Someone may say that to nake women observe purdah within the Imambara r majlises amounts to hypocricy. But it is not so. By making them observe the rules of Sheriat every ime they come to the majlis or into Imambara, we lo remind them what they should be (and are not), ve make them remember what a good Shia Ithna-Asheri woman should be. This 'reminding' is the nost important factor in keeping the torch of faith live. By this 'reminding' they will never forget heir noble Islamic heritage. Remove this restricion, and your children will never know what is he difference between a Muslim way of life and a agan one. Allma Turabi originally hailed from Hyderabac

The God of Islam and His Sacred Sheriat are he same everywhere. A Muslim never forgets his eligion wherever he is. It seems that a notion prevails at the back of many minds that Sheriat was to be observed in East Africa only, where they


All requests for nikah should be sent through the Jamaats or Institutions and where no Jamaats or Institutions exist a mention must be made to this effect.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BILAL MUSLIM MISSION OF KENYA - 1973

1. GENERAL:

During the year, hundreds of people of Duruma Tribe accepted our Faith and until todate more than 2,000 people have become Shias.

Mass meetings were called by Chief Yusufu Ibrahim on Sunday at Mackinnin at which meetings scores of people declared their intention to join Shia Ithna-Asheri Faith.

The Chairman of Ithna-Asheri Supreme Council, Al-Haj Mulla Asgharali M. M. Jaffer, attended one of the meetings on Sunday, 5th August, 1974 and saw for himself the work being done there and addressed the meeting in Kiswahili.

Maulana Syed Saeed Akhtar Rizvi, Chief Missionary of Tanzania Mission, also attended one of the mass meetings when hundreds of people accepted Shia Faith. Maulana addressed the meeting in Kiswahili.

More than 40 people of our Community, including Maulana Aqa Hyder Saheb, Maulana Zishan Hyder, Maulana Syed Hassan Naqvi Saheb, among others, visited Mackinnon to see for themselves the progress being made.

2. (a) MAKINNON ROAD BOARDING AND TEACHING FACILITIES:

During the year, a Boarding Madressa was started under the supervision of Sheikh Amiri Mageni who had been seconded by the Tanzania Mission. At the moment, there are twenty boarders.

Sheikh Amiri Mageni teaches the boarders and also teaches at the Primary School in the area. He also visits small villages around Mackinnon to teach those who have already accepted our faith.

Mrs. Amiri Mageni looks after Nursery School Children and Women who have accepted Shia Faith.

Piped water was supplied to Mackinnon Village at a cost of Shs. 9,300/-.

The villagers donated a plot of 15 acres for construction of Mosque, School, etc. which has been approved by the Government.

(b) SAMBURU VILLAGE:

One of the roving Muballighs of Sunni Faith, Sheikh Ali Omar Dima Said (Akber) settled at Mackinon and then was converted to our faith by Sheikh Amiri Mageni in October, 1973. Sheikh Ali Omar then converted 17 members of his Tribe at Hola and has now been appointed as our Mallim at Samburu.

Sheikh Ali Omar and his younger brother, who had completed seven years in a Sunni Madressa, were sent to Dar es Salaam to learn the basic teachings of our faith and return to Mombasa in Muharram, 1394.

Sheikh Ali Omar (Akber) and Sheikh Ali Mgwame (of Tanzania) have been posted to Samburu where the Sub-Chief of the Area, Mr. Ali Bakari, accepted Shia Faith through the efforts of Sheikh Ali Omar. At the moment, a Boarding Madressa has been established at Samburu where 33 children study. The Mallims also teach Sunni and Shia children at the Primary School at the Sunni Mosque.

3. PROPOSED MOSQUE, SCHOOL AND

Now that approval has already been received from the Government to start construction of Mosque and School, work is expected to start soon. The Mosque and the School with all other facilities will cost us about Shs. 400,000/-. It is expected that it would take at least another six months before the writing work is completed. It will then have to be scrutinized by the Chief Missionary Maulana Syed Saeed Akhtar Rizvi before the book goes into print.

The Samachar records its appreciation for the enthusiasm and serious effort without which this work would not have progressed so well and reached so far, particularly the efforts put by Mr. Hussein A. Rahim M.B.E. who is devoting his full time and energy in preparing useful explanation and comments on every subject.

Observations:

Of the 22 approved loans only 9 could avail themselves of the loan facilities. That are Nos. 3, 5, 10, 15, 18, 19, 20, 21 and 22. The rest of the applicants have not exactly decided their future plans nor have they intimated the Secretariat of their stand. Since the time given to each student to utilise the loan facilities has lapsed, the Secretariat has treated the approved loans as cancelled.

(5) Progress Reports:

The Council's Secretariat has met with unprecedented difficulties from certain students who refused to furnish progress reports for one reason or the other. In one case the Council had to cancel the loan facilities. A number of students under the Council's Education Loan are showing good progress as evident from the periodic reports being furnished to the Council.

(6) Repayment of the Education Loans:

During the year the Council recovered a sum of Shs. 79,826/55 as repayment from the students. The repayment compares favourably with the estimate of Shs. 50,000/-. The Secretariat still feels that a number of parents do not give fair assessment to their incom so as to enable the Education Board to assess th applications on their merits.
